Your Committee are to be congratulated on the active interest they have shown in club affairs and on their achievements throughout the year.

In negotiations with the local Council we have been granted a substantial amount of money to effect improvements in the club-house, which will make our occupancy a more pleasant one and benefit us all. Plans for a second storey, etc., over the existing showers, giving us more valuable changing room, have been completed, and it is hoped work on the building will be commenced during the early part of the season.

Finally, may I thank you for your support. Remember that it is your Club and it depends on your participation for its success.

REPORT OF HONORARY SECRETARY 1961.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen, I have much pleasure in presenting the Secretary's Report for the year ended 31st December, 1961.

This year we have seen a period of consolidation in the Club after the remarkable growth over the last 5 years. We are now a big Club, providing football for 5 senior teams every Saturday, and also a number of interesting fixtures with visiting teams. It is your Committee's aim to provide football for all members who desire to play the game of Rugby and equal consideration is given to the not-so-talented player. The policy is to develop the Club and not necessarily competition winning teams.

Many people are saying in Rugby Union circles that the future of the game in Australia will ultimately depend on "Club football", and while at the moment it is convenient to refer to the "District Competition" and the "Sub-District Competition", the development of Clubs not bound by geographical boundaries is becoming more and more important. Members should remember that the challenge fixtures arranged during the season are just as important and equally enjoyable as the competition games.

Club House.

You are probably aware that we are one of the few Clubs in Sub-District with Clubhouse facilities and we are indebted to the Woollahra Council for their consideration and assistance in this matter. A special vote of thanks is due to our Patron, the Mayor, Alderman A.C. Murchison, for the interest he has shown, and the Town Clerk, Mr. A. Ryan, for his courtesy and help at all times.

Your Committee are, however, conscious of the need to further increase the facilities to cope with the expansion within the Club. Our proposal to the Council regarding extensions and renovations to the existing structure have met with approval and we are told that work is to commence in the month of March of this year. We are also negotiating to secure our tenancy of these premises, and you will be kept informed of future developments in this matter.

I would, however, like to emphasise that the Clubhouse is operated on a roster system under the direction of our Clubhouse manager. The success of this system is dependent on each member pulling his weight. Special thanks are due to 1961 Manager, Bill Bennett and his able assistant, David Lesnie for the magnificent work they did during the year. I ask that the proper support be given by every member to the Manager for the 1962 season.

Grounds.

The playing surface is not yet satisfactory despite numerous

representations to Council. It is, however, a difficult problem to maintain the ground in first-class condition when, of necessity, it is used six days every week throughout the season. We are, however, hopeful that this year there will be a marked improvement when a new plan is introduced. The Chief Engineer of the Woollahra Council, Mr. Hunt, has been most considerate and helpful.

Country Trips and Non-Competition Games.

The policy of the Club to accept invitation games where possible and to arrange at least one country trip per year, was again in evidence.

Games were arranged against The Moree Football Club, St. John's College, St. Vincents Doctors, Sydney Hospital Doctors, St. Paul's College, The Royal Australian Navy, and The Referees' Association. We also corresponded with Coonamble Football Club, Hawkesbury Agricultural College, Walgett, Walcha, Warren, The Blue Mountains, Southern Districts of Brisbane and others. Because of our tight fixture list, we were, however, unable to arrange a game against these teams.

Special mention should be made of this year's trip to Mores. The Club chartered a Fokker Friendship, and we took 40 members on what proved to be a most successful and enjoyable week-end. Later in the season we had the pleasure of acting as hosts to the same Club when they visited Sydney. All those who did not attend missed probably two of the best games of the year.

Golf Day.

We again had a most successful Golf Day and 28 members attended at Rouse Hill Country Club. After 9 holes the golfers and the rest had a most enjoyable barbecue when a trophy was presented to Norman Palmer for the best score on handicap. Norman played in a three-ball with John Barraclough and Michael Rosser and a protest was lodged on the ground that neither of these two was competent to mark a card.

The best score was won by Ian Vallance and the closest to the hole by "Dutchy" Lamens. "Dutchy", after winning this event was unable to complete the round.

Social Functions.

This year the Annual Dinner was held at the Masonic Hall, Double Bay, and the Annual Ball at White City. Both functions were particularly successful and those who did not attend missed two most enjoyable evenings.

Our Annual Smoko was held in the Clubhouse at the conclusion

of the season, and the trophies won during the year were presented by the Club President.

Your Committee also arranged a games night at the beginning of the season and we should like to thank David McCathie and his coorganisers for helping to start the season on a successful financial note.

Vice-Presidents.

Thank you, Vice-Presidents, for the interest you have shown in the Club in the past year, and also those parents and friends who have provided moral support on the sideline.

Injured Players' Fund.

As you are probably aware, the premium payable on a comprehensive insurance policy for a football club such as ours, is prohibitive, and all members are advised to make their own arrangements in this matter. We do, however, run an Injured Players' Assistance Fund and all Colleagues are entitled to claim in respect of injuries incurred while playing for any one of our teams. On receipt of such a claim your Committee will then provide such relief as it is able with the limited funds available.

Coaches.

This year Dudley Grose is retiring from his position as coach of Kentwell. Dudley first started as player-coach with the Whiddon Cup side in 1956, then coached our Burke Cup side for 2 years and the Kentwell side in 1959, 1960, 1961. I am sure all members of the Club would like me to thank Dudley on their behalf for services rendered. Let us hope that he will be able to continue to guide us from the sidelines.

General Committee.

The Committee as a whole has again worked hard, and without detracting from the work of all its members, perhaps special mention should be made of the work done by Eddie Radford in his capacity as Registrar, and as coach of our Whiddon "A" side. Eddie deserved the Honour Cap awarded to him for his efforts in 1961.
