Of course we cannot win all the time but I cannot help thinking that the Club could have done much better than it did.

Many Members may think that rejection by the N.S.W. Rugby Union of our application to join the Second Division was the cause of this temporary slump in our playing standards. But the 1964 Season saw a very strong Kentwell Cup Competition which could be said to be the barometer of Sub-District Union Football. As President of the Sub-District Union I can tell Colleagues that the 1965 Season promises to be one of the best they could expect, particularly when it is noted that the Season will commence with a Seven-a-side Competition and that new clubs will be joining Sub-District. I anticipate that as a result of the strengthening of our competition football Colleagues will be happy to remain a Sub-District Club.

There was very poor attendance at training during 1964 and an alarming lack of support at social functions and these shortcomings, I trust, will not be continued in the 1965 Season.

All we need to do is to get on with the job of improving our standard of Rugby so that once again we can play the fast open game in all grades which made Colleagues such a strong Club only a few years ago. I forecast an excellent Season for the Club and I would urge every Member to do his very best for his Club on and off the field so that we can get back to the good old days when it was a "do or die" effort for other clubs to beat the Colleagues.

Good luck to you all for 1965.

Reduced weekly training attendances have been the cause of much concern to the committee and especially the coaches. It is proposed to enforce stricter measures in the caming Season to ensure that this trend ceases. As I have said before, Rugby being a team game, relies on a concerted effort from from each individual so that the nett result may be one of enjoyment based on team spirit, understanding and above all physical fitness.

Functions were generally well organised and our Annual Ball, held at the White City, was a memorable evening.
