#### **CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT**

The year, 1972, has been an up and down year (football wise) for the Colleagues. The disappointing performances of our Kentwell Cup, as was the case with all South side teams, was reflected in our overall position in the Club Championship. This year a tussle ensued between two North side clubs, Lane Cove and Lindfield with the Lindfield club eventual winners of a trophy regarded by the senior members of this club as Colleagues' and a continual reminder to the rest of Sub-District that Colleagues is the best Club in Sub-District, Despite the loss of the Bruce Graham Shield the Burke Cup was retained for the second year in succession with a crushing win over Lane Cove in the Grand Final. The Whiddon Cup reached the Final but were defeated by Bondi Life Savers. The Judd Cup a'so reached the Grand Final but were extremely unlucky not to have won the game. Our fifth side playing in the Richardson Cup p.oved to be (much to the anguish of the coach, Chris Fay) a source of new talent and buffering power for the teams above it.

Although the new system of district divisions and district trophies for each division, introduced in 1971 by the Sub-District, has proved to be fairer and more beneficial to the "four team clubs", the introduction of the split North-South side competition has to a certain extent done away with the "home and away" games characteristic of previous years. First division football has, I think, suffered in quality because of this arrangement and plans for a complete reorganisation of Sydney Rugby Union back to a basic ten team competition for First and Second Divisions as well as Sub-District have been recently mentioned in the newspapers.

Coaches and their selections received a certain amount of criticism throughout the year and this may have been initiated by the performance of our Kentwell Cup. In previous years when our Kentwell Cup has been winning games little dissension is apparent, however when things go wrong 60% of the club are suddenly better judges than the selection committee. As a member of the selection committee I must dispel any doubts of bias in selection and state that prior consideration was given to the performance of the Colleagues on the football field. A vote of thanks must go to the coaches for their hard work and perseverance throughout the year.

Although Colleagues were less prominent in their social functions than in previous years, those who attended the Beef and Burgundy Night, the Discotheque Night, the Annual Ball and the Trophy Night will agree that a good time was had by all. Unfortunately the Beef and Burgundy Night clashed with Glen Turner's wedding and attendance was obviously less than normally expected. The Disco night was the first of its kind put on at the club and should be a major attraction in future years. It was rumoured that several "white ants" were successful in undermining the foundations however others were quickly squashed

before any damage could be done. The Annual Ball was noted for its first class food, Peter Karr's insistence that the band was on the wrong beat, the arrival of the constabulary to remove carousing singers and the arrival "en masse" at 2 o'clock in the morning of fifty odd people at Stan Duncan's for after-ball revelry. I would like to see a determined effort in 1973 to contact as many Old Colleagues as possible for a reunion to mark our 40th anniversary.

In 1971 plans were discussed for a tour of New Zealand, Fiji and Noumea for late 1973. Fund raising for this tour is well under way and includes, two hundred clubs, chicken . . . drives, raffles in local shopping centres, house parties, telephone books etc. It is hoped that fares and accommodation will be raised as a subsidy to prospective tourists but the amount will obviously depend on those that help. If you are interested in touring or just getting involved in some of the hilarity of raising these funds, get with the strength.

In conclusion my congratulations to Dave Ingham for his best and fairest award, Peter Karr and his Burke Cup team on their Grand Final success.

## RICHARDSON CUP REPORT

To the club, the principal function of the fifth grade side is to provide a pool of reasonably fit players which may be drawn upon as the season exacts its toll from players in higher grades. In this light the 1972 Richardson Cup squad cannot but be judged as highly successful: four players recruited to the club through the side finished the season in the Kentwell Cup team, our regular captain led the victorious Burke Cup team in the Grand Final and almost every regular player played at least one game in a higher grade.

As usual, the team consisted of a loyally intrepid hard core supplemented by intermittently available casual players and new players who displayed such talent that they remained amongst us but a short while. At times we could have, if allowed, fielded twenty players, yet towards the end of the season we were forced to forfeit two games. The by now traditional staffing problems were the rule rather than the exception—but it was a thoroughly enjoyable season.

High points of the season were the two home games when, urged on by scores of cheering supporters, we raised our game to inflict crushing defeats on the Leprechauns and the Armenians. There were several other games which could have gone either way but were lost by very narrow margins and, because it was a win, the 34-0 victory over the Waitara Wombats (sic) deserves honourable mention.

However, the real stuff of which fifth grade sub-district football is made was to be seen at Castle Cove for our engagement against C.B.O.B. third team. On that day we fielded ten players, one of whom was injured and could only just walk. After twenty minutes we lost a player to the Royal North Shore Hospital with a dislocated shoulder. The remaining nine fought on, and, although the match was lost, were splendid in defeat.

Team Captain was Mike Jepsen until he passed on to greater things, whilst the Best and Fairest player award went to Steve Toland. Since more than sixty people played at least one game in Richardson it might seem churlish to single out but a few, but the assistance and loyalty rendered by such players as Mike Webster, Harry Donald, Dave Hickey and Alan Carrington should be commended.
