

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

After having a successful year in 1978, the 1979 season was somewhat of a "flop" or let down.

From being Club Champions in 1978 and having all four sides in the finals we could only find ourselves with the two sides in the semifinals and that's where the 1979 season came to an end.

We had approximately 35 new young members register with the Club. This was very gratifying, but there were different faces at each of the four early season trials which made a selector's job very difficult, and I believe this showed up in the competition rounds that followed.

Members showed too much inconsistency on the field and not enough dedication toward their club and training.

However, I must mention that the Kentwell Cup side showed the Club towards the middle and end of the season, that more dedication towards training won them many games and built up a great spirit amongst their ranks. Unfortunately, they realised this too late. Their form in the beginning of the season was poor and they lost too many games to be a threat in the end.

All playing members have got to understand that to win matches and competitions and most of all to enjoy your Rugby, you simply cannot do this training for an hour and a half on Thursday nights. One must put in more work, whether it be in your own time or at organised training.

It is with great appreciation that I inform you of the Woollahra Council's decision to spend the sum of \$40,000 during the summer months on Numbers 2 and 3 Ovals. They have advised me that they intend to regrade and level these grounds and lay new turf and at the same time remove the old concrete cricket pitches. Thanks to the Council, we look forward to having a superior and perhaps a faster playing surfece next season than we have seen on that ground for many many years.

On the administrative side, the Club ran successfully as the Treasurer's Report and Balance sheet shows. Perhaps the two most important aspects from a financial point of view were the control and sales of all gear and refreshments. The Annual Ball was very well organised and this showed in the attendance.

I would like to thank all Committee Members, Office-bearers and Coaches for their support to the Club, and also to members responsible for fund raising and other functions.

Congratulations to those members who played in the Pan-Am Rugby Tournament in Hawaii. They represented the Club very well in this first-ever Tournament. Also I would like to congratulate Wil Mortlock, John Anderson and Rich Daly for their representation in the Combined Sub-District team which toured Queensland.

Thanks to all Vice-Presidents and to all those old members for their continued support during the year.

Finally, as Club President I must ask every intending player to concentrate and work on his fitness, and by the beginning of March, 1980, present himself for selection as a fit Rugby player, so we may start the season with results

I would like to presume that this year was one of rebuilding and consolidation within the Club. This is the only conclusion one could draw after looking at the results of the season. Also, there was a lack of social functions this year which I must say could not be attributed to the Committee, as we had numerous complaints from local residents after the Good Friday Night "bash," and decided that future functions this year should be kept to a minimum.

The two main functions conducted during the year—the Annual Ball at Kei-Ron and the Trophy Night at Randwick R.U.F.C.—were well attended and most enjoyable. 120 people attended the Ball—one of our most successful yet and my thanks to Tony Glynn for his organisation.

We were somewhat privileged to have three guest speakers at the Annual Trophy Night—Des (how long should I talk for!!) Hoystead, Bob (Pink Gin) Moore and John (I hope you ask me again next year) O'Shea. A great night was had by all, and I would like to congratulatte this year's Trophy Winners, especially Ross Collins for a well deserved Honour Cap.

The other major event of the season was the trip to Hawaii for the Pan-Am International Rugby Tournament of which 15 Colleagues attended and 15 Life Members of A.A. returned. A report of that trip is included in this report.

In closing, I would wish the incoming Committee and the Club all the best for a successful season next year.

Congratulations to all Trophy winners and special congratulations to Ross Collins, our Honour Cap winner, who not only played a high standard of football but also ran a tight ship as Clubhouse manager.

Thanks also to our four coaches for their fair-minded selections, and to the committee for all their work. Special thanks to lan McGregor, who has been registrar now for the past two years; also to the Old Colleagues who once again graced us with their support.

The Tour to Hawaii was a great success, and it got off the ground mainly due to the efforts of Tuba, Ando and Moose, thanks fellas. A full report is listed later. We must go back there in '81 and we need at least 30 players. Plan for it now.

Since its inception in 1933, Colleagues has achieved the following results:---

CLUB CHAMPIONS: 16 times: 1941, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958, 1960, 1961, 1962, 1963, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1970, 1971, 1978.

KENTWELL CUP: 9 times: 1950, 1955, 1957, 1959, 1960, 1962, 1963, 1966, 1970.

BURKE CUP: 7 times: 1957, 1958, 1961, 1968, 7971, 1972, 1978.

WHIDDON CUP: 2 times: 1959 and 1967.

JUDD CUP: 1 time: 1966.

Sub-District football was not played during the war years (1942-1946) so this record spans only a period of 41 years.

Colleagues have won the Club Championship, Kentwell Cup and Burke Cup more times than any other Club in the history of Sub District Football.

This is a tremendous record that we must preserve—so let's get into it in 1980. Friday, October 19, 1979, 4.30 p.m. The combined Colleagues/ Hunters Hill team departed for the Pan-Am International Rugby Tournament in Hawaii. The team consisted of 15 Colleagues, 16 Hunters Hill players and Graham Davies (Sub-District and Newport coach).

The tour got off to a great start when, seated on the plane we found that two of the Hunters Hill lads, namely Andy (the Kid) Moysten and Dave (Crackers) Polly were not aboard. An endeavour was made to stop the plane, but to no avail, and we left them selling their Duty Free to the boys at the bar.

The flight over was very "quiet"; luckily the crew changed when we arrived at Auckland, where we stopped for a 'P.' From Auckland the marathon '10 hour drink' to Honolulu was started, which found the Colleagues in their usual "in flight" form and some of the Hunters Hill boys lacking. Also on the same flight were the Manly team and a team from New Zealand. After the first three hours out of Auckland the bald hostesses gave up trying to keep up with the pace and left the drink trolleys in the aisles for quick self-service.

Two hours from Honolulu, with all the beer gone and spirits prevailing, a slight indiscretion by one of the Manly team caused the grog to be turned off, the Captain to have a few words to Ando, and the Ghost left pleading his innocence.

Arriving in Honolulu 7.30 a.m. Friday we were warmly greeted by Dick Gooch and a lei and transferred to our hotel in Waikiki, where we found that the Hunters Hill Club captain, Ian (Cashmere Cowboy) Ross had lost his baggage and thought he would have to 'busk' on the street corners singing "We are Warriors" for a quid to buy some more. Luckily it turned up the next day (sailor suit, tennis outfit, raincoat, suits, handbag—the lot').

The rest of Friday, Saturday and Sunday were spent recovering at the bar with Mai Tai's. Fog Lifters, Blue Hawaiians, and Egor Specials, which cost three arms and four legs each and had a kick like my last wife. We did manage to fit in two training sessions over the weekend—much to the coach's delight (as he frowned on drinking and was taking the whole thing quite seriously).

Saturday night we attended a Gridiron game at the Aloha Stadium which holds 50,000 people seated and is a monumental place. The game was very interesting, although one-sided, and for those of us who hadn't seen a Gridiron game before it was a real experience. At half-time an exhibition game of Rugby was played between the Manly team and the Hawaii Harlequins, much to the delight of the crowd who had never seen Rugby before and thought we were all mad.

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Monday saw the start of the Tournament and our strongest team was fielded. We played the New Zealand Pirates (who eventually contested the Grand Final) and it was our best match of the Tournament. The score was 0-0 three minutes from half-time when they scored a converted try to make it 6-0 at half-time. Our big setback in the game was our 5/8, Michael Oakley (Hunters Hill), who broke his wrist during the first half and did not play again in the Tournament. The second half saw the 85 degrees heat and grog taking its toll on both sides in the very physical forwards game. We were by no means disgraced by the full-time score of 18-0.

Tuesday with renewed vigour we attacked the Dallas Cowboys (Texas), who were a strong side but lacked experience, and a very popular win to us by 16-6 was achieved.

Our next game on Wednesday was Mt. Roskill—another New Zealand team, who were very good. Some of our players from the first two games had to be rested and a few of the drinkers were put on the field. The score was 16-9 against us ten minutes from full-time, when we lost our centre, Dave Polly—sent off for a head-high tackle. This opened the gates for Mt. Roskill, scoring twice in the last ten minutes for a full-time score of 26-9.

Wednesday night say a free booze-up for all concerned in the Tournament (about 2,000 people), held in a disused Customs Hall on the docks. The Primo (beer) flowed freely, T-shirts and caps were swapped, and with the aid of the host, Dick Gooch, the Ghost led us into song with a burst of "Kidney-Wiper" followed by Cowboy with "We Are Warriors"—both of which brough the house down and got the shirts off.

That night certainly took its toll, as next day (Thursday) we were matched against a team of geriatrics from Hanover, Germany, the youngest of which must have been 35. We lost 7-4. Certainly our worst game and the only consolation being the Mooses' encounter with their poofy breakaway and Bowk's decking a second-rower and splitting of the props' heads with a 'Liverpool kiss.'

In the afternoon we were scheduled to play again, against the Hawaii Barbarians and this was to be extremely important as it was going to the the Ghost's first game of the tour. He arrived at the field with his jumper in Mint condition, socks perfect, boot polished, psyched-up ready to go, only to find, to his relief, that the Hawaiians had forfeited. Our second win of the tour.

Friday brought our finest hour as we were to play Cowra, N.S.W., who happened to be staying at the same hotel and happened to be drinking with us the night before. We again fielded our strongest team and to our surprise Andy Addinall scored from the kick-off. At halftime the score was 19-0, so we decided to put the drinking side on (including the Ghost). The full-time score was still 19-0, but a great game to finish the tournament. Out of the 34 teams competing, Colleagues/Hunters Hill finished 21st overall.

With the football out of the way. some serious drinking was in order for the next six days, combined with some rubber-necking, "tickingoff" numerous things such as Sunset Beach, Waimea Bay, swimming in the hotel pool, eating rubbishy hamburgers. Ando and Tuba's cocktail party, collective semi-screwing thanks to the Ghost, and a contest between Ando, Cowboy, Ghost and Hurt (the Kraut) to see who could
