PRESIDENTS REPORT

It gives me great pride and satisfaction to submit this year's annual report.

In what was probably our most successful year we won four out of the five premierships the club contested. Not only did the four teams win the premierships, but were minor premiers as well, conclusively proving they were the best teams for the full season.

The Kentwell Cup coached by lain Edwards won the minor premiership for the fifth time in a row, making up for last year's Grand Final loss, with an extremely strong performance in winning this year's grand final in a very disciplined manner. Iain and his team set the standard in terms of training and dedication for the club and the result was very deserving. Congratulations to lain and the Kentwell Cup, once again, professionally managed by Ken Griffin.

KENTWELL CUP PREMIERS & MINOR PREMIERS

WON 17-LOST 3
381 POINTS FOR 118 AGAINST
GRAND FINAL DEFEATED ST. PATRICKS OLD BOYS 22-6

Sincere congratulation on this years achievement. The Grand Final performance of the Kentwell Cup in defeating St. Patricks 22-6 ended the season with a statement to all opposition clubs that the Colleagues Kentwell Cup Team was once again by far the best team in the competition. Not only were we minor premiers and premiers but the team set a new club record in the points "for and against" in breaking the record previously held by the 1981 Kentwell Cup team.

Despite this great success I think retrospectively this was a most difficult season. The club commenced the year with a loss of approximately eight Kentwell Cup players and for the first couple of months we struggled to find a front row combination.

Thanks to Steve Roberts, who as Club Captain, lead the way and made himself available as loose head prop from the beginning. Despite family pressures, social pressures and the fear of pain in his back he survived the season and we managed to settle one position. His reward was a try in the Grand Final. Even up to the Semi Finals, the front row positions were still not finalised thanks to Dan Hickson's come and go arrangements. It was a tough decision to reorganise the front row at the finish and award Morgan Chubb the position of tight head prop with Dan Hickson as hooker. However, their Grand Final performance left no doubt that this was the best possible combination.

Despite these difficulties, through sheer perserverance of the players selected each week, we managed to formulate a game strategy which suited the capability of the players.

Just as things were settling down we were disrupted by almost a mass exodus of the Kentwell Cup to the Combined Sub-District Team. Sincere congratulations to John Noice as Coach and Morgan Chubb as Captain of the Combined Sub-District team and that teams three wins. However, without the assistance of Brian Weir, Malcolm Sinclair, Michael Grosman and Geoff Bush, I doubt whether the team would have done so well and they are to be congratulated on their selection.

About the same time Nick Rice was lost to overseas and eventually to a broken arm, forcing the re-organisation of the second row. In this regard Andy Lomax came to the fore and provided along with Brian Weir, immense power in the scrum and showed great determination in raising the standard of his play as the season progressed. Both Brian Weir and Andrew Lomax have to be congratulated in their Grand Final performance wherein with the front row they dominated the tight play. It is disappointing that Brian Weir has moved to Melbourne but I feel that Andrew Lomax has

cemented himself a position in the Kentwell Cup for some seasons to come.

About half way through the second half of the season Peter Clark was showing signs of strain and indicated that this was not the year for him. To his credit he saw out the season and was of great value to the Burke Cup.

The back row remained reasonably stable during the year and the speed of Sean Deverall and Michael Collett to the loose ball enabled us to gain the advantage in the second phase play. It showed great determination for Sean .o keep himself going every week when his body seemed to take so much punishment.

Michael Collett played throughout the season his consistant failsafe game and deserved (although it was a very close contest between Doug and Mal) the award of the Kentwell Cup best and fairest player. His goal kicking in the Grand Final was exceptional.

As Captain Malcolm Sinclair had an extremely competent season, despite the difficulties of taking over from our stalwart leader of yesteryear — John Anderson. It took Mal some weeks to settle into the position as Captain. However he picked up the pieces as the season progressed and did an excellent job. He led the team with confidence, determination and pride and was a great example to the club in his general play and his work effort on the club committee.

As halfback Will Curry did all that was of asked of him, trying his hardest especially at training. He was a great assett to the team and a constant source of worry to the opposition. It was fortunate that despite his injuries he was able to see out the Grand Final in such a convincing win.

Kevin Lane had another excellent season. His leadership in the backs controlled what was otherwise a difficult situation in relation to what we hoped to achieve versus the skills we had. His hands, passing and running skills still makes him the best 5/8 in the competition as he proved to the opposition each week.

Geoff Bush as inside centre showed enormous improvement from previous years. he started slowly, bit the bullet, and then got stuck into it. His determination in defence and straight running was a great assett. I expect him to do better as I believe he has now developed a taste for the Kentwell Cup.

At outside centre Michael Grosman was devastating in defence and unpredictable in attack. I think in the future his best position would be winger but with application he showed improvement during the season to discipline his play. It was unfortunate that the pressure from work seemed to interfere with his training schedule as I believe with more training he would have improved further.

The wing positions were again difficult to select and it was not until later in the season that John Salmon and Alister McDonald settled into the team. Both had exceptionl games in the Grand Final playing their best games of the season. Their cover defence, tackling and especially aggression in counter attack played a large part in the team's success during the season.

Last but not least Doug Ambrose at full back played his best season to date. He is to be congratulated on being not only the leading try scorer along with Malcolm Sinclair but also in being the leading club point scorer. His attitude to the team and the club reflected in his play and he was a constant worry to the opposition. Whilst his play has matured, I still do not believe he has reached his peak and look forward to seeing him do better again next year.

In reviewing the season only a few games stand out:

- The first round clash against Hunters Hill at Boronia Park where in we came back from a try in the first three minutes to win 27-4.
- The return clash with Bondi in the first round wherein thanks are due to John Anderson for his help in coaching in my absence. It must have given him considerable pleasure to see the team under his coaching 'revenge' — last year's Grand Final loss;
- The round two annihalation of Lindfield 39-3 after the 22-6 loss in the first round. Lindfield never regained their confidence after this game and fell from leading the competition to being an 'also ran'.

In thanking all those who were involved in the Kentwell Cup a special thanks must be given to our back-up team. Particular thanks to Eddie Radford for his honest and impartial advice and assistance during the games.

Sincere thanks to Chris Cusak for the time and effort he put into videoing the games, which was to the team's longterm advantage. We have gained a lot of pleasure from being able to review these games and without Chris' assistance, this would not have been possible.

To that loyal group of reserves who stood on the sideline cold and cheerless, my sincere thanks. It was comforting to have you available and your support was an essential part in the club and the team's success.


To my fellow Coaches John Noice, Mike Fitzgerald, Andrew Williams and Tony Glynn sincere congratulations on a great season.

Minor premiers and premiers for the fourth successive year. This is a record in Sydney Suburban Rugby and contratulations to all those players who made this possible.


The team was captained by Geoff Travers. His experience was backed up by the regulars in Hugh Warden and Tim Booth. They always had our forward pack well motivated and operating as a solid eight showing dominance.

The front row position shared by Andrew Chubb, David Wiadrowski and Tim Booth and together with their hookers Tom Fraser and earlier Doug Kirkwood provided the team with a strong base up front.

Second Row Geoff Travers was partnered during the season early by Andrew Lomax, then guest appearances by the experienced John Anderson and finally by David Wiadrowski. Whatever the combination our second row was always in control. The back row consisted of Hugh Warden, Greg Tarplett, Bill Powell, Tim Cullen and later Peter Clark. Hugh had his usual consistent season and his general field play combined with his superb lineout work made him very instrumental in the game stragey. Greg and Peter had strong games particularly in the Grand Final and their talent and experience showed out over their rivals. Nasty injuries cost the "loosies" Tim Cullen and Bill Powell their position, but they also had a strong hand in the Burke Cup success.

Problems in the lineouts and controlling the ball in second phase during the year were ironed out as the season progressed. From then on the forwards gave generally good possession to the backs. This was just as well, as our Grand Final rivals, the Blue Mountains team, had a very strong pack. However, the power of the Colleagues "eight" finally had its effect in the second half and the opposition buckled under pressure.

The backline, ably led by the veteran and Vice Captain Stuart Hudson, playing his forth consecutive premiership, scored some brilliant tries. 
WHIDDON CUP

JUDD CUP

Among the successes achieved by the club during the 1984 season were the minor premiership and premiership wins by the Judd Cup. The only other Judd Cup premiership win by the club was in 1966.

Ar.y win in a lower grade competition by a club successfull also in higher grades is an indication of the strength of that club. Colleagues are a strong club; 1984 was probably the clubs greatest year.

During the season the Judd Cup team scored 218 points for and 38 against, and were clearly the minor premiers with 16 wins, 1 draw and 1 loss. The team beat Waverley Old Boys 7-0 in the final and Newport 13-3 in the grand final.

The club has contested numerous Judd Cup finals over the last 18 years, eventually winning again in 1984. As a result of the club's strength Judd Cup fielded a good 15 players every week, largely due to the depth of players available from Tony Glynn's successful 5th grade side.

The other major factor contributing to the Judd Cup was the establishment of a nucleus of players keen to assist in winning not only the club championship but also the Judd Cup. The nucleus started with Andy Thorburn, John Bunce and Toby Mashall. During the season and as teams began to settle down the nucleus grew and with that growth came a team. Initially the nucleus was joined by "our" Charles Bavin (who played all but one game in Judd Cup during 1984) and hooker Rick Fitzgerald (the teams "best and fairest" player). To these players were added Adam Tilley, Greg Tamsett and Andrew King. During the second half of the season the nucleus grew to a grand final winning combination with the arrival of Mark Bowker, Dave Harris, John Plimmer, Michael France (actually he returned) Tim Brosnan (only because he knew we would win) and Tommy Porter. The team was completed with the 11th hour return of Mark Smith, Max Compton and Craig Phelps.

In addition there were many other club members who played in Judd Cup and who together with the abovenamed contributed to the win in 1984, not the least of whom included Moose Collins, Bruce Diggle, John Hitchen and Jimmy Theodore (I refuse to play prop anymore so I retire).

No success comes without the club strength, i.e. the players. Behind the players stands the club, its management and facilities. In addition any one team gains further support from coaches and managers.

NEW ZEALAND TOUR 1984

After a week of celebrations following the Grand Final victory, the tour party departed for NZ on Friday 7th September.
