THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 1986 Rugby season proved to be very different to what we have been used to. Our off field activities overshadowed the on field activities — an imbalance we must correct for 1987. It was decided at last years AGM to update the facilities of the club house. Significant time and money was spent over the year in doing this. A new bar was built — enabling better security and faster service. ACI, our major sponsor, kindly donated two large glass door refridgerators enabling us to have a ready supply of cold refreshments. The hot water service was replaced throughout the club with a new ceiling put in and a heater connected. Wall panels were replaced and most of the electrical fittings and wiring updated. A program has also been put in place with the Woollahra Council ensuring regular maintenance for the next three years. The club house is now in good condition to enable a concerted effort to be put into improving our results on the Rugby field.

1986 was the first year since 1978 that we did not win a premiership. The Burke Cup performed well in winning the minor premiership but unfortunately lost the Grand Final. Fund raising was very successful this year with the two games nights, organized by Tony Glyn contributing strongly to the finances.

The Annual Ball held at the Keiron was well attended with everybody having an enjoyable night.

Steve Roberts had decided to step down as Club Captain after three years. He has put a lot of time into the position and is to be thanked for his efforts.

Congratulations to Tony Glyn on winning the Honour Cup for 1986. He has been a strong contributor to the club as both a player and coach. His efforts this year in fund raising, organising renovations to the club house, and organising the Annual Ball, definitely earned the recognition he received. It is hoped Tony will continue his very valuable support to the club.

My thanks to the Coaches for their time and efforts this year. With the tough year they stuck at their jobs, and with a little more luck we could have done much better. Iain Edwards, back with the club again demonstrated what hard work can do with the Kentwell Cup having a very successful second round, just missing out on the semis by one point. This should give them the impetus for a strong 1987. With lain probably leaving the club we wish him every success for his future coaching aspirations.

The committee this year once again found that a lot of work is needed to ensure a successful year. Bill Curry did a good job with the addition of Tim Lee as assistant bar manager being very beneficial.

For the future, the members must ensure we do not fall into the trap of resting on our laurels. We have been the most successful club in Sydney Suburban football and a strong effort from every member will be needed to return to this position. We must be prepared to find the new players, encourage the existing players, and train hard.

After three years I am stepping down from the management side of the club. It has been a challenging but enjoyable time for which I thank the members for their support.

Individually Andrew Lomax gave a great performance in the second row and deserved the award of Kentwell best and fairest, Andrew Chubb despite some doubts from many proved his worth in consolidating the front row following Morgan Chubbs urgent overseas departure, Jeremy Simpson kicked us to a win on more occasions than not in the second round and Michael Collett gave his usual safe performance in the loose.

Doug Ambrose as Captain did his best at full back returning with interest the ball that came his way. Unfortunately his hamstring problems prevented him playing the running full back game. However, his heart and voice (as the referees noted) was in the game every Saturday for the Kentwell Cup to win.

In summary the team feel satisfied with the season's result as a whole. Since there was always total commitment, enthusiasm and determination to succeed there can be no criticism and with the results of round two to build upon the Kentwell Cup is in a much better position to approach the 1987 season that it was at the end of 1985.

My thanks and congratulations to Doug Ambrose as Kentwell Cup Captain for his persistance and support during the season. It was for both of us a difficult and frustrating season to see so much effort being put in with so little apparent results but by no means should it be considered a failure as the end of the season's results of the Kentwell Cup and Bourke Cup have served to keep the proud record of the colleagues club to the fore.
