PRESIDENTS REPORT

Dear Members

1993 has been a very good year for the Woollahra Colleagues, both on and off the field. It was also a crucial year for the Colleagues as our competition had changed totally following the merger with the Sydney Second Division and the challenges off the paddock with regard to a clubhouse and ongoing financial pressures.

On the paddock we had great success this season. The most noticeable being that the club for the first time in five years had three teams in the semi finals. Congratulations to the Burke, Whiddon and Judd Cups, their coaches and managers. Unfortunately, none of our sides were able to win the Grand Final, Burke Cup getting the closest.

With the changed competition this year, it was critical for Colleagues to finish in the top 10 teams of the club championship. It would be fair to say that one of the totally unknown quantities this season was the strength of those clubs joining our competition from the Sydney Second Division. Throughout the season, Colleagues showed tremendous spirit and ended up finishing eighth, only 26 point being the fifth placed side, which was an incredible effort. Another success for the Colleagues this season was the fact that Rick Howe was selected to play for the Australian Subbies representative side as hooker. Unfortunately, they were somewhat overwhelmed by their opposition in the Australian Under 21 side to the tune of 103-0.

None of this success on the field would have been possible without the time, effort and dedication of Hugh Taylor who, for the last three years, has been Kentwell Cup coach and this year was also the Club Coach. Hugh, with the help of his other coaches, has rebuilt the Colleagues and given us a very sound rugby base for the next few years. This is obviously subject to the Colleagues continuing to show the commitment and spirit as exemplified by Hugh in the past few seasons. I think that one of Hugh's biggest disappointments was that he could not take Colleagues to a Kentwell Cup Grand Final. This was certainly not as a result of any lack of commitment or training on Hugh's part, but more a lack of determination and concentration at critical times by the Kentwell Cup team. My thanks to Hugh Taylor for all his efforts over the last three years and I wish Hugh all the best for the future and hope to see him down at Colleagues regularly.

Financially, the club had one of its best seasons ever and this has been due to the efforts of all the members of the committee but in particular to: Tim Booth, who has worked tirelessly all the year and had huge success with Sixtieth Anniversary Dinner. Nigel Davis, who was always there when needed to help or lend a hand with some good ideas and finally, Stuart Hunter, who is one of the unsung heroes of Colleagues as a result of the amount of time and effort that he puts in to ensuring the club is run efficiently. My thanks to all those on the 1993 committee, but in particular to those three.

The major issue for Colleagues in the future is to ensure that they obtain tenure over the grounds and obtain the right to build a club house or refurbish the existing club on the grounds. Considerable progress has been made this season with the Council. It is important that this progress is continued into the future. It is also important that the club continues to have a sound financial base from which any efforts to build a new club or refurbish the old clubhouse can be funded. One of the ways to ensure the future of the club is make sure that the older Colleagues are retained as active members of the club.

Our 60th Anniversary marked a new era in Colleagues Rugby history. A decision had been made to strengthen the second tier of rugby in Sydney by amalgamating our competition with the Sydney Metropolitan Cup. The clubs finishing in the top 10 at the end of the season would then form a new second division competition for 1994.

The decision left Colleagues with two alternatives; to be relegated for the first time in our history to the third division or take advantage of the opportunity to advance into the tougher second division competition. Naturally, we accepted the challenge and with great relief we secured our position with two rounds to go.

The Burke Cup side proved to be our most successful team, reaching the Grand Final only to lose narrowly to Hornsby, who they had drawn with in the major semi-final. Whiddon and Judd Cup achieved successes, both finishing third in their respective competitions. Kentwell faced a much stronger competition than in previous years which was reflected in their final ranking. Sutherland Cup was again a great asset to the club in introducing many new players.

The above successes were a combination of a number of factors. This season however there were three dominant reasons; a growing core of players which brought stability, an improved playing level, especially in the lower grades and most importantly the commitment and enthusiasm of our coaches. I would like to thank the coaches Hugh, Mark, Sean, Damien, Brian, Andrew and Stew for their many hours during the season in what is often a trying task.

Our social season this year was organised by Nigel Davis and Tim Booth with assistance from David Apps and Richard Fisher. The highlight, once again was the Ball. The main aim of having the majority of the players and coaches attend was certainly achieved with an attendance of 220 people. The Colleagues parties were unfortunately kept to a minimum. However, the annual Dry Friday party still managed to attract a huge crowd albeit a bit too noisy for the neighbours.

The 60th Anniversary celebrations culminated in a Black Tie dinner organised by this years John Anderson Trophy winner in Tim Booth. The night enabled the current players and coaches to hear first hand some of the clubs memorable history from many of the old Colleagues who attended. The night represented a solid beginning to our building fund drive.

The Clubs administration was managed by Stuart 'Squiggle' Hunter and Andrew Cooke as Secretary and Treasurer respectively with Tom Fraser as President. These roles often go unnoticed yet they are critical if the club is to function properly. I would like to thank each one of these gentlemen for their tremendous effort. I would also like to thank Hamish White for his help especially with the organisation of the jerseys throughout the season.

Finally, I would like to thank four people who without their contribution our club would be a lot worse off. Toby Lawson, for his previous two years as Club Captain, which enabled me to take up my role with the club in a healthy position. Richard McGrath, who always found time to help out. Tim Booth, a great Colleague, who always got things going on match day and was a great source of intelligent advice and Hugh Taylor who has been more than a coach over the last three years.

We should take heart from the season past and look to next season to go even further and achieve two or three grand final wins. For this to happen it is important we retain the majority of all our current players to build a strong and successful club.
