Also we must make special mention of the support given to the club in our initial year of marketing by our sponsors and Non-Playing Members. The names are formally listed further on in this report.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The season started early again this year with the usual runs from Bondi to Bronte and back. That was way back in February when most of us had still no intentions of putting on the blue jersey. Thinking back to those runs it was hard to gauge what the season would bring, were there any new stars, faster wingers, 5/8ths with better hands, good line out jumping 2nd rowers or fat and fast props. It was hard to tell but all was revealed as the season progressed.

The first two trial matches were against UNSW and Hawkesbury respectively. Some of the familiar faces had returned along with the usual sprinkling of new players. Really, however, those two trial matches didn't look positive. Any concern we did have, however, was quickly eroded as the trials wore on and the usual latecomers shook off that lazy summer feeling and ventured down.

The next trial was at Orange against OAG. We left wih 36 guys early on Saturday morning and made it up there, via a very luxurious bus trip and Brad's local knowledge, just after lunch. The trip to Penrith was our first match of the season. It was a good start with Sutherland and Burke winning and Kentwell drawing. Kentwell should have won but the situation was not helped when both centres came off through injury in the first five minutes. The club blooded several new players that day right through the grades, many of whom completed the season and will add to the growing nucleus of Colleagues in the seasons to come.

The following Wednesday night we had the annual new players night. The night would have been a standard affair if not for the then undiscovered talents of Johnny Pappas who made amateurs of us all with his unique rendition of Tooti Frooti. Well done, John, it showed a lot of guts.

The next 3 games against Hornsby, Hawkesbury and UNSW saw mixed results in the higher grades while the lower grades were clocking up wins.

The next game against Knox was intended to be Colleagues' revival. Unfortunately this was not to be. In a low day for the Club, however, Murray C, the eventual Rookie of the Year, turned in one of the great performances of the season with a 3 point game in Whiddon followed by another 3 point game as a replacement in Burke. It was no surprise that Murray ended up in Kentwell.

In the next two rounds the situation did not improve and our Club Championship position was looking precarious with just under half the season gone.

The turning point of the season was to come against Waverley, the local enemy. After securing wins in Judd and Burke it came down to Kentwell to win the day for the Club. Unfortunately, it was the one game of the season I missed due to family commitments in Wagga. I called from a service station about 200km from Sydney and was one happy little Giant when Ben (Jnr Woodsy) told me we had got up after being down 16-nil after 10 minutes. The Bellevue did well out of us that night!

A bye followed Waverley with the next game against Hawkesbury Ag, the eventual Club Champions. We went down in all grades against except Sutherland who continued on their winning way. The loss proved most expensive to Burke who at that stage were just clinging to the four.

The next weekend, save for our two rounds against Waverley, was our best day. We started well with Sutherland and Judd winning close games. Roger G was probably thanking the rugby gods for the Judd win when with 10 minutes to go before kickoff half his team had not arrived. We, of course, with the exception of Roger, were not worried as this tactic had worked well for them in the previous matches. A slight hiccup with Whiddon, who went down narrowly, was followed by a last minute win to Burke. The match of the day started off badly and by half

time we were down 16-nil. Hugh T, who by this stage was fairly worked up, delivered arguably his shortest but most effective speech of the season causing Kentwell to run on in the 2nd half a completely different team. Hugh B scored two tries and in the process played the best back game of the season. The final score was 29 to 16 our way.

The return match against Penrith was Kentwell's day. We had only managed to win one game during the day (Judd 5-nil) so it was obviously important that Kentwell won. This they did with a 38 to 5 demolition of the eventual 4th place getters.

Next week we had a bye and for a change we had the inaugural Colleagues Game Night. It was an informal affair which proved successful. Thanks to Matt C who helped out on the night and well down to Glynny "The iron man winner" and Bruce the official fastest man in the Club.

The next five games registered mixed results in the top three grades while Judd and Sutherland continued with their winning seasons.

Sutherland, with the help of a vast number of players, had by now cemented themselves in the top three and were the favourites with Waverley. Stu M had done a fantastic job to date, however, he still had a big job ahead. Judd were also in contention for their semis and had formed a good nucleus of players including John R, the captain, Angus B, Mark A, and both Boothies which gave them that important stability edge.

The Final round of the season was fittingly against Waverley who had become our traditional rivals over the past 10 years. During the week we had been advised that there was relegation for the Club which finished last in the Club Championship. This caused us a lot of concern as we were only marginally off the bottom and a loss to Waverley in all grades could have almost certainly lead to relegation. The fact that Colleagues had never been relegated in its 61-year history added further pressure. We went on to win Sutherland, Judd, Burke and Kentwell which placed us in 7th place for the season and any fear of relegation was removed. The feeling in the Colleagues' dressing room at the end of the day made my Club Captain role all worth it.

At the end of the competition rounds we had two teams in the Semis, Judd and Sutherland.

Judd went down in their semi, in a close match, after conceding a penalty in front in the last two minutes of the match. It was an unfortunate way to finish the season but they had, nevertheless, made the club proud. Sutherland won their match and consequently progressed into the grand final in two weeks' time. In the free weekend before the Sutherland Cup Grand Final we had the Annual Ball at the Grand on Bondi Beach. I hope everyone got a chance to thank Adam O for the effort he put in to organise it.

Sutherland's biggest crowd of the season turned out to support them the following weekend for the Grand Final. They ran with the wind in the first half and went to a 6-nil lead by half time. The second half was played mostly in St Pat's half with Colleagues defending the line. Their tremendous defensive effort did not allow St Pats in and we ran out victors, 6-nil.

Sutherland's win in the GF was a great way to finish the season.

The final event of the season was the Trophy Night. Congratulations to all the winners, including:

KENTWELL CUP



We again started as last year with high expectations. Perhaps we were somewhat sobered in our excitement due to our very tough opening four rounds.

I must admit that it was very dissapointing at pre-season training to have such low numbers and the same old faces. The players should by now have realised how important the early games are, and again it was our slow start which cost us so dearly later on.

We started off with a draw with competition favourites, Penrith and would have won if our preparation had been better. We then lost the next five games although fairly narrowly, none-the-less it basically blew us out of the competition. Through all this we had built a solid forward pack and for the first time had some depth in the second row with Andrew Purchas and Ian Simpson playing 2nds and Grant Tracey and Ian Mann in 1sts. Our front row was a bit of a worry at times but we had Dean Clark and Rick Howe back with the discovery of Murray Cox – definitely one of the most skilled players I have seen at the club, we were more than formidable. George McKelvey spent most of the season in one of the front row spots and was an excellent find because of his scrumming prowess. The back row was settled in Dog on one side and Mick Nelson at loc kbut the other side I had problems with all year. Sean Corbett did a great job defensively but generally I struggled to find a really good attacking open side breakaway.

The back line early in the season was a major problem, injuries being a major contributor. We basically had problems in all positions except the wings, where Hugh Beveridge and Reg Blair were outstanding all year with Hugh really showing his class in the 2nd half of the year when he got the ball with a bit of space. Matt Collett and Brad Davies both had good games a 5/8th but with all due respect, this is an area the club has to look at in the future. Vision is a vital commodity in a good 5/8ths make up, eg. knowing when to kick and when to

pass. The way the modern game is played, the ball is coming a lot more to the 5/8th and his decision time is possibly a lot less, so therefore it is a vital position in terms of decision making.

I feel in defence to our 5/8ths this year, we were troubled through our first 6 or 7 games with centre combinations and it wasn't until Henry Walton finally overcame his injuries and Richard Parker and Andrew Gooch showed up that we were able to pick a first grade back line. To add to this, Mark Gibson, who I rated very highly from the previous year, also stuggled with injury and it wasn't until late in the season that he showed his true colours.

Our half back situation was similar with injuries to Sean Watt and Simon Brownlow, but we found Al Clarke who did a great job and was definitely one of the real finds of the year. At fullback Matt (I'll pass when I care) Bannister did a great job although reluctant as I have said to pass the ball, it was position David and I were always relaxed with. Along with Deano and Darbs, Matt was great for team spirit and kept us going at fairly low times throughout the season. Mick Nelson was my captain for the major part of the season and as well as adjusting to a new position, did a great job. Mick has matured enormously both as a player and in this case as a captain. He, along with Rick Howe and Dog Poolman are the only players to have been with me for my four year coaching stint at Colleagues in Kentwell Cup. Wil Kendall is another who has been there and fittingly finished the season so admirably in 1sts. I might also take the opportunity to not only congratulate Will, but to thank him for his support and encouragement through my coaching stint at Blue Giant Park.

I would also like to thank Brian Wood, our President on his support of me personally. He was always very calm and always worked with me which I found very encouraging. I would like to congratulate Stew McCure on a fantastic season and on a job well done. For hisorganizing skills alone, Fosters Brewing would pay a fortune to have him.

Congratulations also to Roger Garner on a great season along with John Ryan. They continued the Judd Cup success and it might even be time for Ryano to try his coaching skills. It was a tough year for Hugh McFarlane and Hugh Warden, going so well for 2/3's of the season then to come to an abrupt halt. Fifths and fourths success put added pressure on 3rds and it was no more evident than when the coaches pulled their boots out of the cupboard. Scotty and MarkGray-Spencer had a frustrating year, looking so good at times yet like the 1sts, they discovered ways to lose rather than win. Scott and Mark would have learnt heaps this season, particularly the frustrations of coaching. I would really encourage all these guys to have another season as you will not only be much more knowledgeable but the players will be able to relate to you so much better.

Thanks to Darby for his work as Physio this year and Norm for his tireless work on the sideline. Stuart Hunter, who came in for some criticism late in the year and under a lot of pressue from work, did a great job. Remember this guys, these guys give up their time for you for no reward.

Lastly and most importantly, I would like to express my great pleasure in having coached a season with my brother. I think it is a true test of one's friends when you coach together, let alone when you bring family into it. David ran the backs all year and the longer the season went, his influence and planning shone through. He realised early that only one person can do the talking and he let me assume that role (although it must have nearly killed him). We finished the season as we started as good mates which speaks volumes for our blood line when you consider what we went through. I really hope David coaches next year and possibly with Scotty Grey I'm sure they would have a great year.

I want to thank all the players for putting up with my incredible mood swings. I have made some great friends through my association with Colleagues and I will look back on my four years probably not realising the success I would have liked, but still with great memories.

Just going through the team, there are some comments we would like to make on the players who played Burke Cup in 1994.

The front row consisted of General, Matt Pearce, Tim Crawford, George McKelvey, Guilleaume Brahimi and Bob the Canadian. I would first like to make reference to Matt Pearce who is a credit to any player who played Burke Cup this year with tenacious ability in and around the rucks that kept many opposition hookers on their toes. This was evident in him winning the Players Player award for the second deserving year running. Ian Simpson was deservedly Burke Cup Best and Fairest showing a commitment that was recognised by players, coaching staff and the fact that he never got injured. He never whinged, he just got on with the job every week and that made him an absolute pleasure to coach. Hopefully Simmo we will be back down next year and I look forward pulling on the number 5 in the top grade.

The back row for a coach is extremely difficult because it usually deals with people who are too slow for backs or too short for the second row. This leads us to Dugald Lamont. Doover wasalways at training and his commitment was rewarded with continual selection in the Burke Cup back row. A fitting reward for a total club man.

The plethora of back rowers at the club included Adam Upton who, until he broke his jaw in an accidental collision, was providing real force in the side and I look forward to seeing him fresh for next year. Paul Hoyer (aka Carlos or The Axe) on the odd occasion found himself playing third grade due to selections in Kentwell and Burke Cups, but his ability was deserving of a genuine Burke Cup player and it's unfortunate that he is retiring at such a young age. He'll be back. We would also like to thank Jack Brenac, Hamish White, Sean Corbett, Mark Malloyand Darran Cooper and Richard Edwards. Without their efforts we would have really struggled. Finally, Sam Vivers who played a bit of first grade and mostly second grade had a great year and was always giving 100% in leading from the front. We look forward to seeing him next year.

Onto the backs. Sean Watt, who played until injury cut him short, Ross Bloore who has a magnificent pass and I look forward to seeing him next year developing those fantastic skills he does have and Toby Lawson. Toby is one of those people who talks more than he runs and andcalls for the ball when he doesn't really want to catch it!

Moving on to the 5/8s, we had 3 players in this position throughout the season and the majority of this time was split between Brad Davies and Matt Collett. They are both exceptionally talented footballers who both game breakers on their day with their running and passing ability allied to their skill of kicking goals from all over the paddock. When Brad was playing with confidence running, there is no better player in the club and a player of his ability should go a long way in the game should he choose to take the advice of people who coach him. Matt Collett is probably the most outstanding running 5/8th in the club. This year however we found something out about Matt that surprised a lot of people.
