

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Colleagues success in 1996 was extraordinary in so many ways. This is highlighted by the performance of the club in 1997, certainly a contrast. As you read through the reports of the coaches and the financial statements of 1997, you will realise what a difficult year this has been. Having said that, I think that as a club we kept our heads above water on and off the football paddock, and have the makings of a very strong 1998 and beyond. Sometimes we need a reality check, particularly after unparalleled success, and this year has done that for us.

In summary, the club finished fifth in the club championship, which was the same position we finished in 1996. Our most successful side was the Burke Cup who finished third in the competition, losing to Chatswood in the minor semi-finals. Particular recognition should go to Nigel Davis, Peter Colquhoun and the players for their efforts in 1997. I would also like to thank the coaches and managers for the work they put in this year. It should be noted that the club lost more than 50 players from the previous season as well as all of the coaches. To finish in the same club championship position should be duly noted for its worth.

Financially the club has had a poor year. This is totally the responsibility of the President and for that I humbly apologise. However, running a rugby club is a team effort. We had the problem of having insufficient effort from everyone on the committee and I have made a point of ensuring that this situation is not repeated in 1998. The clubs losses for 1997 are attributable to a number of factors. Our purchases ballooned because of the success of 1996 (we awarded just about every jersey the club owned). We have expensed every gear purchase, despite the stock we still hold. Subscriptions were well down on last year. This is a problem for committee to solve for next year. Our bar sales were well down on last year, mainly because the Saturdays at the beginning of the year were wet, and hence attendance's were down. Further, the less success on the paddock meant crowds were generally smaller. Sponsorship moneys were down as well and that money had to absorb increased costs. In sum, very little went our way on the financial front. A lot of lessons have been learnt and I am sure most of these issues will be addressed by the incoming committee.

Looking forward, the club is finally on the verge of building a new clubhouse. I have been at the club or 10 years and the new clubhouse has always been on the agenda. Whilst we need to raise a significant amount of money, we have the approval of Council, the nearby residents and the club members. This will be the single biggest challenge for the Colleagues in 1998 and beyond. It is for that reason, that a separate Committee has been formed to co-ordinate fund raising.

I would like to assure members and supporters of the club, that we are in a strong position to deal with the challenges of the future. There are a lot of fine people at the club, and we should be looking to support them as they take the club in to the next century.

Colleagues are a club for the players, by the players. We must strive to remember what we are here for, and that is to provide the best social rugby environment possible. At times we flounder somewhat, but I know the club has its spirit and its attitude to rugby well and truly intact.

It is great honour to have been President of the Colleagues. I would love to have given the club another 1996, but it was not to be. I am disappointed to be handing on the duties after a tough year, but I will still be involved as much as I can. Once a Colleague always a Colleague. Good luck in 1998.
