PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Colleagues,

On behalf of the Committee, I provide the following annual report for the 1998 season.

Football

The club's success during 1998, although not outstanding, certainly provided some personal satisfaction to me as President and I know to others in the club simply for the way that, despite a problematic year for Kentwell Cup, that Kentwell never stopped trying and the lower grades and Colts certainly rallied in the latter half of the season to ensure that the club avoided any threat of relegation and, in the case of Bourke Cup, Whiddon Cup, and certainly Judd Cup, were either semi finalists or close to semi finalists at the end of the season.

First Grade certainly had the potential to beat any team in the competition as was exhibited by its second round display against the University of New South Wales who became the eventual premiers. Unfortunately, at crucial times, a lack of focus and discipline certainly cost them dearly. I feel if the nucleus of the team can stay together, and with a couple of new recruits, the 1999 season should prove very successful. Thanks to Scott Gray-Spencer in his final year of coaching for the Colleagues. Certainly his record at the club speaks for itself,

Bourkies were probably the most consistent team throughout all the grades in a competition which is always highly competitive. Unfortunately they fell at the last hurdle and did not compete in the semi finals but certainly they were at that standard. Congratulations must go to Peter Colquboun for getting the most out of his players and moulding a team into what became a very competitive force.

Whiddon Cup unfortunately had a very slow start to the season, no doubt due to a lack of direction through the changing of their coaching personnel. However, once Dennis Orrock took the reins their charge towards an almost semi final berth was spectacular. In his first season as coach Dennis certainly showed some tremendous ability and I am happy to say that he has decided to continue on with his coaching and be involved with the Kentwell Cup team in 1999. This augurs well for the new season.

In relation to Judd Cup, they were the only team to make the semi finals which I believe speaks volumes for their coach (modesty precludes me from telling you who that was!).

All in all and given Kentwell Cup's disappointing run, the club came together well and performed with great spirit.

Trading and Financial

At the commencement of 1998 the main focus which I stressed upon the Committee was for us to turn around the very poor financial trading position that had occurred during the 1997 season. I can say with great pride that the Committee in 1998 achieved that goal and, save for three weekends towards the end of the season when it rained, the trading figures I believe would have been the best the club has ever experienced.

The turnaround in trading performance had a number of factors, mainly being tighter control of the bar, tighter control of what occurred at home games and also the particularly good level of sponsorship that we achieved in 1998. I would like to thank all the sponsors for their support and hope that it can continue into 1999.

I am confident, given early indications that the sponsorship level in 1999 will be the same if not greater than in 1998 and given that most of the Committee from 1998 is returning in 1999, that the continued strength of the financial position of the club will continue.

New Clubhouse

I can confirm that the Australian Sports Foundation has now officially registered the new grandstand project. This allows the Club to raise money (which must be donated to the Australian Sports Foundation) on a tax deductible basis. I am sure the Building Committee will be announcing a number of fundraising activities for the 1999 year.

Present indications are that over and above those funds which the club presently holds, that

the fundraising will have to be in the vicinity of \$200,000. I feel confident that if all Colleagues contribute towards this goal it will be easily met. Certainly, as the Club goes into the next millennium, I believe that the new clubhouse is an essential part of the club's growth and future and would look to all Colleagues for their continued support in relation to this project.

Acknowledgment and Thanks

I must sincerely thank all the Committee during 1998 for their support and I would make particular mention of the Club Secretary, Richard McGrath (who was acknowledged by receiving the Honour Cap award for 1998), and Justin Crawford, the Club Captain, both of whom contributed enormously to the club's administration and financial success in the 1998 season. I am happy to say that both Richard and Justin will continue on the Committee in 1999. With those two individuals actively participating at Colleagues, the future certainly will be well organised and administered.

Finally, I would like to thank all Colleagues for their support, both those presently participating at the football club and also the old Colleagues. This has made my position a very pleasurable experience and one that I feel greatly honoured to hold.

SECRETARIES REPORT

The 1998 season again saw an increase in the number of players to pull on the Sky Blue jersey. This year we had 164 registered players plus a number of guest appearances from former stars, interlopers and some just pulled out of the pub on a Friday night.

A new system of insurance was introduced through the union at the start of the season. Previously each team was insured by the one premium, regardless of who played, of about \$800. This provided cover for death, some disability and the club was also insured for public liability.

Under the new system each player is covered individually for death and disability, up to \$2,000 per injury, \$250 a week income protection and the club for \$10,000,000 public liability. The premium for each player is \$50 and the club becomes liable for that amount when a player has played 4 games, this year we covered 100 players.

Those players that were injured found the system satisfactory. Players with serious injuries and had private health insurance benefited the most as the union insurance covered the gap between private health insurance payments and actual medical bills.

Meetings throughout the year were well attended and run very constructively by Mark Gray-Spencer. Our club is the only club in Kentwell Cup that is run exclusively by the players, a long Colleagues tradition I understand from past players.

Our financial success through this season came from many sources. The fantastic support from sponsors organized by club captain Justin Crawford and Kentwell coach Scott Gray-Spencer. The bar was extremely well organized by Martin Lanauze, John Purbrick and Paul Henningham. Always a difficult job but not a problem for this team.

Support from past players by way of non-playing subscription (only \$50), and attending home games was appreciated from a financial perspective. More importantly it is invaluable to the moral and culture of the club. The entire club lifts on 'Old Colleagues Day', and Kentwell Cup players in particular tell me how much they enjoy playing in front of a large crowd with so many past greats and current characters.

Subscriptions were up this year and needed to be under the new insurance scheme outlined above. It is disappointing to report that some players neglect to pay their dues. As a way of emphasizing the importance of each individual being responsible for being 'financial' I propose that we should simply roll the debt forward to the next season rather than clean the slate as we have in the past.

To our retiring treasurer Martin Roberts we owe an enormous debt of thanks in steering the ship around from 1997. Marty was always on the job and I wish him well with his UK posting.

This was my 7th year on the committee. Each year the pressure on us to do more from the union is enormous. Given the increased work load I arn pleased to report that the club received very favorable reports from the union and did not incur any frees despite the appalling conditions on many match days.

Congratulations to all those involved in the 1998 season and I look forward to 1999. Richard McGrath

COACHES REPORT FOR COLLEAGUES KENTWELL CUP

It is safe to say that 1998 would not be remembered as one of our strongest performances on the field. However, if you look behind what started off as a very tough year, a group of talented footballers did enough to maintain the Colleagues Club, under very difficult conditions, in the Kentwell Cup division.

As per normal, the pre-season training started late with a number of veteran footballers from the Kentwell team deciding that they might not play 1998, this contributed to a disruptive start to the season. The season did unearth a wide variety of talent in different areas, with players called upon from all different grades to fill the ranks in the Kentwell Cup side.

I might just go through the games briefly to endeavour to show the closeness of a lot of games that we played throughout the year and the untiring commitment some players showed.

The first round was against Mosman at Rawson Park. Unfortunately we were under-prepared and needed a bit more experience at the higher level before we could genuinely claim to be a Kentwell Cup side.

Our second match was at home against Old Ignatians and due to some awkward bounces and concentration lapses we lost by one point and on reflection I think Iggies was a team we should have defeated and in the second round we proved on their home ground that we were the better side.

The third match of the season involved an encounter with St Pats in which Toby Barbour had an outstanding game but unfortunately two early tries and one late try sealed our fate on a very difficult and sticky pitch at Hudson Oval.

It was round five when Grant Lodge was introduced to the Kentwell Cup side and this proved to be a good influence over many other players in the Club. Grant had a strong game against Chatswood unfortunately he missed a couple of late penalty goals and we lost 9-8 but Colleagues were at that stage on the way back.

The next round saw us at home on Ladies Day at Woollahra against the eventual premiers New South Wales. The performance showed that we could match it with any side. On that day we scored more points against the premiers New South Wales than any other team throughout the whole season and my hat goes off to the backs especially, marking some of the more difficult and very slippery customers out wide.

Thinking that we were on a run, we then played Mosman at home and unfortunately we fell short of our expectations on the field, although our pre-match psyche up was outstanding from memory.

We then moved to Old Iggies at Ryde Oval for one of our better and more competent performances of the year. The team was at that stage led by Grant Tracey who had come out of retirement to play in the front row and his leadership quality lifted the performances of many of the other Kentwell Cup players.

Round 12 was probably one of the most committed performances of the year in terms of believing in your own ability. Although we lost the game 7-0, the game was 0-0 against the eventual premiers. In the 76th minute I recall we attempted a field goal which missed and NSW ran the length of the field to score under the post in the last minute to win the game. NSW described it as a spiteful and uncomfortable encounter and if next year every encounter could be like that for other teams it could be well rewarding.

Round 13 was the highlight of 1998 being Old Colleagues Day at Woollahra Oval with an outstanding and mesmerising performance by Steve Bourne and Sean Kelly, ably assisted by Grant Lodge in the centres. We ran away with the game 41-0 demonstrating to us that when this team fired it really had the capabilities to out-gun anyone.

I don't really need to dwell on the remaining games of the year but would suffice to say that on an individual basis there were some great performances, but on a team basis knowing that we couldn't make the semis we did let our guard slip.
