1-0 President's Report

The 2004 season proved to be another successful year for the Colleagues.

The Rugger

Our on field performance culminated in playing in all grand finals from Kentwell through to Sutherland having been knocked out of the competition controversially in Colts and having secured the first past the past Halligan in early August.

We walked away from that day with just the Whiddon Cup for the trophy cabinet but with a lot of pride in how the players, coaches and supporters had conducted themselves throughout the season. For that reason I find it difficult to pick out individuals to highlight for this report because it may do an injustice to many who gave of themselves to the Colleagues in 2004.

Therefore I will talk about the effort from all. The coaches in supporting one another and sharing the workload around throughout the season. For their honesty and faith in their players under sometimes difficult circumstances when dealing with such a large player group. The coaching staff of 2004 worked hard at getting selections right and were excellent council for one another. The high standard of organisation was appreciated by players and all can take a lot of satisfaction in the season.

As committed as our coaches were the players. Playing rugby is hard work and failure can be all too close for the unsuspecting. I found that the vast majority were very committed and that was borne out by the results through the year in only just failing to take out the Club Championship. This season may dim over time but never forget that it took you and those around you a lot of work to get where we did.

Outside of our Subbies competition we sent our Convicts back to England and they just fell short of winning the Bingham Cup and on the third attempt our team brought home the Bali 10's.

The Bucks.

We are pleased to report another profit for the club.

After a number of years of large capital expenditure we feel that the clubhouse and grounds are now of the highest standard and should service us well for many years to come. The new scrum machine certainly caused some excitement for the usually dour forwards but I don't think that the backs have noticed it yet.

Our main drivers of revenue are subscriptions from players, bar sales, The Long Lunch, the "200 Club" and our magnificent sponsors. All of these revenue streams are very important as we try to rebuild some sort of capital base that will put the club in good steed in the coming years. I am grateful to the efforts of the many people who organised these processes and events and in particular to those who have generously supported the future of the Colleagues.

Esprit

People often ask me to compare one year against another. I find this an impossible task because if you are a Colleague every year is a great year. If pushed I rate 1998 as without doubt the most difficult yet it was a very satisfying year.

Put simply it is the people who are involved with the club who make it a good year. We have been blessed over the years with individuals who will take up the challenge to make every year special in its own way. That is the imprimatur of the Colleagues that I have noticed most during my time at the club.

Again this year there was a willingness to not rest on our laurels and to improve on previous high standards. The Colleagues have enjoyed many magnificent years in its history and I will guarantee that not one of those was a result of people standing back and letting things drift along. That is not to say we can not yet again improve and we surely will.

Although we had our largest player numbers ever there is still the great interest in how the other teams performed with groups of mates being spread through the grades. The Convicts were an unusual and welcome addition to the club. At the start of the season there may have been a few raised eyebrows, but by seasons end I feel that there were a few stereotypes torn down about gay people and 'boofheaded' footballers. I think we learned that we are all comfortable with who we are.

Ahead

We continue to be frustrated in the process for getting the final go ahead to replace the ground lighting. It will now not be until the New Year that we can get the go ahead and we are very confident that this project will proceed. New lights will certainly make training a degree or two safer but also ensure that we can manage wear and tear on the grounds surface as well as train more effectively.

In February the Colleagues will host the inaugural Bondi 10's, a charity event for the Royal North Shore Hospital and Bali bombing victims. I think that this is an exciting innovation and I feel that it will be great success as it will show case all that makes Rugby great, the game itself but just as importantly the camaraderie that it endears.

To all those who were associated with the Colleagues in 2004 I thank you for your patience, toil and support. I hope you had as good a time as I did and I look forward to seeing you in 2005.

I come to the end of my tenure as Club Captain at Colleagues as a very satisfied man. The Club is in fantastic shape, and continues to grow and develop in a manner befitting a place of such tradition and strong values. Being involved with rugby organisations on a professional basis, I can honestly say that Colleagues puts many of its more celebrated rivals to shame with its dedication to the upholding of the Colleagues mission, and its simple philosophy of enjoyment and tolerance.

On the field, 2004 was a superb year by any stretch of the imagination. The last hurrah again failed to provide the ultimate overall results we wanted, with several teams falling at the final hurdle on Grand Final weekend. But, again, we can look back and be immensely proud of what we achieved as a Club during the season as a whole.

While my shoulder injury meant that I missed out on the successful Whiddon Cup Grand Final this year, I am proud to have been part of the 2004 Colleagues campaign, which I consider to be the best Colleagues season I have been involved in, both on and off the field.

Whiddon Cup

A massive congratulations to the Whiddon Cup side who won the Major Premiership (as well as the Minor Premiership) for only the fourth time in the Club's history. A fabulous effort from all involved - a classy season which finished as decisively as it had begun, 17-8 to the good guys. To come back from 8-3 down at half-time was testament to the spirit in the side which has led from the front all year.

A big thank you to Jon Purbrick and Hamish McCathie (as well as Ed White) who erased two previous disappointments to come up trumps in their third year at the helm of a Colleagues side.

Special mention to three Colleagues stalwarts - Justin Crawford, Jonathan Clydesdale and Grand Final day skipper Richard Byrne - who secured their first premiership for the Club after many years of long service. The experience in this trio was complemented by some fantastic young Colleagues who will become great club men in years to come.

Halligan Cup

Congratulations also to the Halligan Cup sides which took an unassailable lead in the Halligan Cup relatively early in the season, ensuring that Colleagues secured its first piece of silverware in season 2004.

After a mighty season which saw the real Halligan spirit come to the fore, the Halligan sides finished in first and second place on the ladder. In a tradition started by Colleagues when it had two Burke Cup sides many years ago, the sides did not play each other for bragging rights. Instead, Colleagues was simply crowned Halligan Cup champions.

My thanks go to Rob Rosenberg and Laurie Campbell-Avenell for all their hard work in a notoriously tough job. And to the players who put in solid performances each week - congratulations on behalf of the rest of the Club.

Bali

Colleagues' solid 2004 continued with the Bali tourists taking out the 2004 Bali Tens title in October. A big congratulations to the entire squad for bringing home the silverware at their third attempt and maintaining the important and dedicated tradition of Colleagues touring.

Convicts

I was delighted with the success of the Convicts who joined Colleagues in Season 2004. As Sydney's first gay and gay-friendly rugby side, the Convicts as part of Colleagues broke down many of the traditional barriers which have existed over the years.

The Convicts joined Colleagues as a training mechanism for the Bingham Cup in London in May, which they bowed out of admirably in the semi-finals. The Convicts comfortably won all their pool matches and quarter-final, but a couple of key injuries were sustained. The heavy schedule saw them suffer a narrow loss (6-3) in the semifinal to the eventual champions, the San Francisco Fog.

I also wanted to acknowledge the efforts of the Convicts as the Halligan III side, particularly to those who stuck around and played in various sides for the rest of they year and contributed to the Halligan premiership.

Thanks to Andrew Purchas for all his help and commitment this season.

Other Grades

The Barbour Cup (Colts) competition was a closely fought thing all season. Defending a premiership is really tough, but these mini-Blue Giants showed extraordinary toughness and spirit all season. They were cruelly undone in the semi-final by an Old Iggies outfit unwilling to pack a proper scrum. The Colts should be delighted that, at the very least, they provided some superb judiciary antics for members of the Committee. But on a serious note, well done to them all, and a big thank you to Ben Wood, Chris Warfield and Peter Schumack for a great season – we look forward to seeing the Colts develop and play many more games for Colleagues in years to come.

The Sutherland Cup season was tight and tough and ended with a defeat against Iggies in the Grand Final. Iggies scored two runaway tries against the run of play, and these were enough to hold off a committed Colleagues side 14-0. Well done to Will Foster, Benny Waters, Noodle and the team for a fantastic season in getting to the Grand Final from fourth spot on the ladder - no mean feat.

The Judd Cup side went in to their Grand Final against the Iggies Dream Team having beaten them in the major semi-final two weeks previously. Jonny Melia's try from the kickoff set the platform for a committed Colleagues first half which saw them lead at the break. Iggies, to their credit, came back strongly in the second half to hold off a fast-finishing Colleagues side by the narrowest of margins, 15-14. Andrew Moses led by example all day, and the Juddies should be extremely proud of the football they played all year. A big thank you to Jon Irwin and Mitch Tourle (who had a sensational year in his first year of coaching) as well as Muffy for all they did to get the Juddies to the Grand Final.

Adam Upton led the Burkies for most of the year again, including the Grand Final, which saw the Blue Giants go down to Drummoyne. Although the Burkies played some sparkling rugby in 2004 and continued to fight back all day, they never really hit their straps on the day and seemed to be playing catch-up for the remainder of the match. Well done and a big thank you to Adam Upton, Michael Boyd and Tony Martin for another great year and for the Minor Premiership.

I thought the Kentwell Cup Grand Final was a truly entertaining game of rugby played at a standard which Subbies could only have dreamed about even ten years ago. I, along with the Club, was immensely proud of the 2004 Kentwell side - all resolutely amateur, unlike some of our friends at other clubs - and our congratulations go out to them on a fine season, especially after the disappointment of 2003.

Stu Brown was inspirational (even up to when he burnt his boots on the oval during the Grand Final recovery weekend) and Dave Jepson was one of the best forwards coaches I can remember at the Club. Thanks also to Justin Crawford for his managerial skills which he juggled beautifully with the resurrection of his (premiership-winning!) playing career.

I also wanted to mention Dan Kelly's phenomenal effort this year, playing every game except round one, and coming agonisingly close (1 point) to the all-time Colleagues point-scoring record for a season. To see the development of DK and Alex Smith (happy to get off nude after scoring a try in the Grand Final), who both came through the colts program, was a highlight this year - well done.

I cannot thank Geoff Fenwicke enough for all he has done for Colleagues over the last few years, but particularly this year. He is not only a great bloke, but has developed into an excellent communicator and an outstanding coach with a rare ability to read a game. His award of the Honour Cap this year was an outstanding and deserved tribute to a real Colleague.

Congratulations also to Jonathan Clydesdale and Matt Kowal on being selected in the NSW Subbies Representative side this season.

- Seeing people with an unquestionable dedication to a Club which often goes unrecognised, like Richard McGrath, Justin Crawford, Tim Booth, Will Foster, Jon Ryan, John Pappas and Dan Petrie. They are the heart and soul of the place.
- Helping in a small way to integrate the colts into the Club to the position of strength which they are in now, and to see guys like Dan Kelly and Alex Smith come through the system, and hear Tim Martin say he is determined to be part of a rare father-and-son combination to play 100 games.
- Seeing the way in which the Convicts were welcomed with open arms, hearing stories of how they were so surprised by the levels of acceptance and encouragement, and how Bruce Donald (a 300-game Colleague) saw his gay son become a Colleague too.
- Seeing the Club grow from near-relegation in 1998 to the point where we have new facilities, 9 grades and

SYDNEY CONVICTS (HALLIGAN III) 2004 SEASON IN REVIEW

April and our first official game saw us having to ring our travel agents for directions as we were matched up for an away game against Campbelltown. This would be the first time we would wear the All Blue of Colleagues and the Halligan III side was born. The trip deep into the west saw us face some "interesting" opponents, but the team stuck to their guns and their game plan and a victory was secured (12-0).

Further games against Mosman (29-5) and Drummoyne (19-0) saw the side continue to build momentum with convincing victories. Word began to spread within the Subbies comp of this gay rugby team that Colleagues had. Rumours had always abounded that Colleagues were fond of the odd frock (after all they did live in the Eastern Suburbs and they always look so neat and well dressed). But to have a side that was both open AND winning was unheard of.

The 1st May bye gave the Convicts a chance to host the only other gay rugby team in Australia, as the Brisbane Hustlers made the long bus trip down from north of the boarder to take on their more fancied opponents. Despite their enormous size (keep it clean) the Hustlers we no match for the Convicts who went on to win the inaugural Purchas Cup 29-3.

The game of the Halligan Cup was to follow as the Convicts took on Halligan I in the very local derby.
