Presidents Report 2006

The Woollahra Colleagues enjoyed a successful season in 2006 both on and off the field. Colleagues managed to win the premiership cups in Whiddon, Barbor and our first ever Noice Cup in the 5^{th} Division. Most teams participated in finals campaigns with Burke Cup being defeated marginally in the Grand Final. It was also pleasing to report an increase in the clubs cash position at year end.

The year's football started well with the second running of the Bondi 10's. The tournament expanded to cater for 20 teams and we are looking at a capacity 24 for the 2007 tournament on February 9 and 10. It was our great pleasure to make donations of \$12,000 each to Royal North Shore Burns Unit, Zero to One and Plan. These donations were made at our 6th Long Lunch which was very well attended with over 200 Colleagues but has also become an important event for raising funds for the club.

As per usual the Kentwell Cup side at colleagues, there was a mixture of new faces in the first grade side as well as a number of new faces generally at the club. The early part of the season saw some mixed results, losing a rather uninspiring game to St Patricks away in round one and then a thumping victory over Mosman at home. The following week saw the team venture out to David Phillips Field where the team put in their worst performance of the season losing 31-3 to University of New South Wales.

Those who had been involved with the Colleagues Kentwell side before knew not to read too much into it as a recent history suggests, Colleagues are notoriously slow starters. A tough win against Forrest at home, and a close loss to Drummoyne away got the Giants back on track. This was followed up by a resounding 49-15 victory over Waverley at home which was one of the highlights of the season and it seemed God was shining on blue giant stadium that day.

A win against newcomers Campbelltown, losses to Knox away and Old Ignatians on the bell on Old Colleagues day left a collective foul taste in the team's mouth coming into the week off. It was time for a turn around, time to take this season by the throat and start to build game by game in hope of a finals burst.

There was a meeting of the coaches, and some extra training sessions were called. Following the week off, the Giants came out charging to beat St Patricks in the return fixture at home by 50 points. However a loss to Mosman the next week away reminded everyone that you take nothing for granted in Kentwell cup. The slippery conditions at Rawson park proved trouble for the backs, although provided a field of joy for the forward pack. Unfortunately it was not enough and underneath a burning Mosman clubhouse, a resolute Whales side got home on the bell to win 26-24. This was a real turning point in our season. Although we were putting it together on the field, the points were not showing on the scoreboard. It was time to up the workload and start to get serious for the run home.

In the following weeks Kentwell defeated University of NSW and Forrest away in one of the wettest, muddiest, coldest, and sandiest days of rugby of the season. The following week the Giants played Drummoyne, the undefeated and form team of the competition at our temporary home ground of Waverley oval. Leading the whole game, the Giants ran out of puff and were pipped on the line again to lose 21-26 in a game that was there for the taking and proved that on their day this Kentwell team could match it with anyone.

Away wins against Waverley and Campbelltown were good for our position on the table, however another close loss to Knox at home didn't help the running. Making the semis became a mathematical game. An away win against Old Ignatians on their gala day was crucial. Sure enough Colleagues lifted for the occasion with the forward pack dominating a weak Old Ignatians outfit, 61-24, allowing the Blue Giants to sneak into the semis in 4th place.

Drummoyne were to play Knox in a 1 versus 2 battle and the Giants were to take on Campbelltown. Preparation was good, with minimal injuries and a generally fit prepared unit on the day. A few new moves had been added but the more expansive wider style of rugby which had been introduced prior the Campbelltown game during the rounds had been adapted to well by all involved, with a plan to play position early.

Unfortunately the game ended in a draw and through finishing 3rd on the ladder Campbelltown went through to the knockout semi final against eventual grand finalists, Knox. Looking back on the game, it seems to be a little more execution on the day more than anything. The style of play for the game can be talked about over and over however I believe it needs to be put into practice on the training paddock and game day repeatedly. Winning semi finals is not about

doing anything different, but more about doing what you do best, just 10% better. That's what got you there; just lift the intensity a little.

The season did see some players really develop and improve on their games. Special mention must go to James Symonds at hooker, Sam Burton Taylor who made the shift from 7 to 9, Willy Davies, Mark 'Funky' Foy, Matt Prowse and of course his lovely girlfriend for all her support.

A huge thankyou must go out to the Kentwell Sponsor - B Braun Australia. The continued support from Dave Crawford and the team is absolute gold and does not go unnoticed- thanks DC.

This is my last season coaching the Kentwell Team. It has been a great honour to coach the blue giants in Judd Cup in 2004 and Kentwell Cup in 2005 and 2006. I have learnt a lot working with the other coaches, Justin Crawford, Johnny Irwin, Rob Dalton, Benny Waters and the Burke Coaches of Matt Collet, Jock and Duncan Whittle, thankyou for your perseverance. It has also been great to work with all the players Lion, O, the Arab, Kiddy, Henno, Clydie, Willy Davies, Fat Munson, Simmo, Schuey, JV, Dick Thomas, Prowse the mouse, Hilly and Billy, Piko and Funky to mention a few. Thanks and all the best for Kentwell cup in 2007.

Burke Cup Report

Burke Cup 2006 began the new season with a number of new faces and a few older ones. The first couple of games were tough as the boys found the combinations a bit rusty. First round against Pats was survived by 1 point after the men in black scored on the bell but missed the conversion. Then came a bit of a shock as Mosman took kindly to Blue Giant Stadium and relegated Burke to only their second loss in over 20 games. The team rebounded with a grafting 5-0 won over uni and continued to misfire with an unconvincing 11-3 win at home versus Forest. Drummoyne loomed as the biggest challenge of the year so far but the boys started to find their feet only to relinquish a hard fought lead with a soft try to come away with a 12-12 draw. Up against a struggling Waverley combination, the boys put their first 4 try performance on the board but failed to turn up the following week as Campbelltown belted the Burkies out of the season as the team walloped the previously unbeaten Knox side 15-0. The score line belied the dominance the Burke cup side showed as the penalty count against was 20-2. Some consistency began to creep in as the old foe of Iggies was summarily dispatched 22-8. The first round was completed and the team was sitting in a respectable 3rd position.

An extended mid season slump failed to materialise as the Burkies strung solid but not outstanding performances together to claim Pats 27-8 and Mosman 21-12 away. Maybe a little bit of over-confidence showed as Burke played 10 mins that being the last 10, of the next game versus Uni, to be denied by a passionate defence 12-10. The roller-coaster season continued as the side was in real danger of missing out on the semi's with a number of tough games coming up. On what can only be described as an ordinary day, the forwards took charge and accounted for a dangerous Forest side 24-10 in a foot of water. Drummoyne was skipped due to the weather and the next game was against Waverley on the sand-pit. The team played like it was opposed training on Thursday night and put 45 points on without conceding any. This form continued into the following week with an outstanding 57-0 win against Drummoyne, again at the sand-pit. This was a home game and it was probably good grace that it was played away from Blue Giants Stadium as the teams only losses in 2006 regular season came while playing at home. An inability to finish saw Campbelltown claw their way back and scrape into a 27-27 draw away.

The re-match with Knox was on the horizon and we were suddenly down a few key players. The Burkies got thumped 34-3, 5 tries to 0 and received the wake-up call required to send them into the semi's knowing they had to play some great footy to win the comp. They completed the regular season with an encouraging 13-0 win against Iggie's, which denied them any chance to get into the semi's, and looked forward to taking on Knox for the second time in the space of two weeks in the major semi. It was encouraging to finish a clear second and the boys knew they had a great shot at the title.

The major semi started poorly as Knox took an intercept and darted under the posts for an early lead. From there on however, the Burkies mounted the pressure and were comfortable going into half-time 10-3 down knowing they had plenty left. A second penalty goal and some punishing forward play drove the boys to the line and they penetrated the struggling defence for a try in the corner. Burke was up 11-10 and looking good. The heads weren't switched on for the restart as within 2 mins, a brilliant solo effort saw one man step 5 players and score to put Knox back in front 17-11. Further ball control and a great pile of pressure saw a second try down the left touchline to go to 17-16. The conversion only just missed and the boys knew if they could put the next points on, they were in the GF. An extended drive and subsequent penalty to Burke gave them a shot to win it with 2 to go but unfortunately it sailed wide. A gallant defeat but some very encouraging signs gave the boys plenty to think about but the next step was to triumph in the preliminary final against a resurgent Mosman side that had won 7 straight.

A good week of training lead into an ordinary Saturday where downpours and gale force winds plagued sides all day. The Burke side took the hard road and played into the wind early and was rewarded with a 7-0 lead after 5 mins. Mosman began to utilise their pace out wide and only some amazing defence kept them out for 33 mins. Unfortunately it couldn't be maintained for 35 as the wall cracked and we went into half-time 7-5 up. 2 driving tries by the pigs in the first 5 minutes put the game in a comfortable position and a further penalty goal gave the Burkies a very solid 20-5 win. Defence was good, combinations and moves were working. It was shaping up to be a great GF.

Come the GF, some hard selection calls were made but the side looked sharp. It was a warmhot day with the boys needing to take on fluid and conserve a bit of nervous energy. Kick-off came and an early bust nearly resulted in a try but the last pass didn't go to hand. The boys went down 3-0 but were containing and dominating the Knox side as they had planned and went into the break 6-3 following tremendous retention of possession and pressure. Knox came out in the second and stunned the Burke boys with their pace and aggression at the breakdown. Some great leg-drive and clean-out limited the "holding on" penalties against us but Knox showed clear dominance in broken play and phase defence. Sustained pressure and an opportunistic run gave Knox the first try of the game though there were a number of calls that the ball was held-up. The Burkies then piled on the pressure and time after time hurled themselves at the Knox defence which held firm until another last pass slipped from the grasp over the line. With the tanks on empty, Knox looked to have wrapped it up with 5 to go but was disallowed for holding a defender back. One last gasp shot didn't quite come-off as Knox's pilfering ability resulted in another turnover. The Burkies went down 10-6 but left nothing on the pitch and showed they were a real force. Well done to Knox, it took a great side to stop this Burkie side from winning the title.

In summary, a sterling year where we only fell 4 points short of the title. Consistent, yet coachniggling, appearances from Alex Edwards resulted in him being awarded Burke cup best and fairest. Other standouts included the physical presence of Paul Hart, Simon Gardiner, Bill Cheadle and Jamie Stevenson in the latter part of the season. The late inclusion of Christy Condon to the starting lineup fitted in well with the experienced leader Cam Ireland and the cuddly Shumack who may be off to Newcastle next year. A large number of backs were used this year but the cunning of Gareth Gower and co (TJ, Knighty and Mander) was often a pleasure to watch. The back three was a mixture of guile, pace and talk with Lip, Matty Dwyer, Ollie and Disco proving an outstanding last line of defence. Notables also included Kiwi Bob, Leo "Hoff" Coates and many others that turned out during the year.

Main things to take into next year:

- Destroying their pilfer.

Together with up and coming Colleagues youngsters and new players Andrew Watt, Stuart Hughes, Jono Linn, James McCourt, Pete Davies (best and fairest for the season), Rick Hall and the club's top point scorer Rory O'Driscoll, the Blue Giants are in great hands next season. Particularly

pleasing was the fact that a number of our squad have filtered through our colts ranks and are already making their mark in senior grades.

On behalf of Jono Hughes, Paul Howard and myself, many thanks must go to club coach Rob Dalton (for providing invaluable feedback to us, particularly on match day), Will Foster for managing us like a well oiled machine, Jack Mesley for his support and coaching input during the finals, Richard McGrath and committee, tireless supporters like John Noice and Tim Booth who backed us every week, and most importantly the players for keeping "Horace" at Colleagues for a record third year in a row - it was a really fun and enjoyable year.

Jeffries Cup Report - Colleagues Convicts

2006 was a momentous year for the Sydney Convicts. The first year we have entered two teams in the Sydney Suburban Rugby competition in the Halligan and Jeffrey Cups and planned to travel to New York to compete in the 3rd biannual Mark Bingham Cup.

Despite having won the Halligan Cup undefeated in 2005 the Convicts knew that playing in the first grade of the 5^{th} division – the Jeffrey Cup – would be a significant step up. Playing at 3 pm for 80 minutes against Clubs for whom this was their top team was going to be a challenge for

the Convicts with players with a wide range of playing experiences. We recognized that playing at this level was going to provide us with the perfect preparation for competing in the Bingham Cup and next step for many players who had improved considerably over the last 2 season.

The first game of season against Oakland was perhaps the highlight of our domestic season. The Convicts Halligan team won its first competition game against Roseville which provided enormous inspiration to the Jeffrey team. Our game against Oakland was hard fought but the Convicts ended up winners scoring 3 tries to 1 and winning 17-5. We suddenly knew that despite the movement up the grades we were very competitive. This was the first weekend the Convicts had fielded two teams let along winning both games. Most other gay clubs in the world have taken many years to win their first game against regular rugby teams let along two in the same weekend.

The Convicts Jeffrey team played 3 games before leaving for New York. With 3 clubs dropping out of the 5th division competition there were only 5 clubs left. This meant there were numerous byes and weekends off. The closest game we played prior to heading to New York was against our Noice Cup brothers. The game was fought with the intensity that normally accompanies intra club matches. The Noice boys game up eventual winners, winning 12-6. This game unfortunately marked the last game of the season for our star fullback Matt Vagulans who ended up having a 5 hour operation to repair significant damage to his left knee.

Congratulations to the Noice boys for premiership winning season. They are a great bunch guys who constantly supported us throughout the season. In fact for the 4 weeks we were in New York these guys backed up and played in the Jeffrey competition, playing two games each Saturday. An outstanding effort, for which all the Convicts are extremely grateful.

The New York Bingham Cup was the high point in the Convicts short history. The third Bingham Cup saw 30 teams from around the world compete for the equivalent of the Gay World Cup. The Convicts touring party was 60 strong, including 41 players, 3 coaches, 2 physios, 2 managers and an assortment of partners and supporters., making it the second largest contingent in the competition. The Australian Consulate welcomed the Convicts contingent to the Big Apple by hosting a cocktail party – with many Consulate staff being very appreciative of the show provided the boys – which any rugby would be proud.

The Bingham Cup was split into three competitions, - the Cup, the Bowl and the Plate. The Convicts competed in the Cup and Plate. As you have read in the Convicts Halligan Report, the Convicts won the inaugural Mark Bingham Plate competition. The significance of this achievement should not go unrecognized. For many of these players this was their first year playing rugby and for many others it was many years since they had played any physical team sport. Whereas all other teams competing in the Plate competition had 25 competitors – these boys survived and were victories with only 16 men who played 6 games over 3 days. A remarkable effort. Special tribute should be made to Breezy, Simon Thompson, Sam Minter and Geoff Horn, all of whom were inspirational in their leadership and dedication to the team.

The Convict Cup team was recognized as one of the favourites of the competition given their strong showing at the 04 Bingham Cup in London and being the first gay team in the world to win a premiership in a regular competition in 2005. The Convicts won their pool games relatively easily beating Bingham 04 runners up – Manchester 23- 0, the LA Rebellion 34-0 and Seattle Quake 36 - 0. The coaching staff of Rob Rosenberg and Alex Pascoe did an outstanding job of ensuring the team was in the best possible condition and form to survive three very torrid days of rugby in 30 degree heat.

The Gotham Knights, the host of the Bingham Cup was one of the surprise teams of tournament, only losing one of it pool games narrowly to reigning cup holders San Francisco

Fog. The Convicts meet them in the first quarter final and despite having the first points scored against it won the game with relative ease 17-5.

The last day of the competition saw the Convicts meet the Washington Renegades whom were beaten 20-0 and then progress to the final against the arch rival and existing Cup holder San Francisco Fog. There was no love lost between these two teams. In fact there was little love between Fog and any other team in competition. This is saying something in a gay rugby tournament. The final was a very torrid affair. The Fog is renowned for its blanket defence. However our forward domination, pace out wide and electric inside backs were just far too strong and victory belonged to the Convicts – 16-10, with Colleagues' Liam Brosnan being the only try scorer of the match and the player of the tournament for the Convicts. Victory was sweet, with the Convicts being only the second team to win Bingham. The celebration was long and hard with most Convicts not finding themselves back in Sydney for at least another fortnight.

With the excitement of our Bingham Cup campaign over it was time to return to finish the Jeffrey season. To say that to back up was difficult would be an understatement. We had numerous Cup players either retire, travel overseas or conveniently become injured. Despite this there was a commitment bunch of guys who were determined to see the season out and maintain the pride the Sydney Convicts and Colleagues. In addition many of the Halligan Cup players backed up week after week. Despite only limited success in the remaining 8 weeks of the competition we only just missed out of the final 4 by 3 points. This was an amazing achievement given that we were away for 4 weeks and the jump in the grades from Halligan Cup last year.

All in all a very successful season for the Sydney Convicts. Special mention needs to go to the outstanding job done by the coaches Rob Rosenberg, Alex Pascoe and captain/come-coach Charlie Winn. Without these three guys there is no way the same success would have been achieved. Mention should be made of the most improved player of the year – Greg Holmes, best forward – Charlie Winn, best back Tommy Bourne, highest point scorer – Dean Tapiki, Best and Fairest Gorgon Cooper, Players' Player – a three way tie between, Tommy Bourne, Stu Marks and Charlie Winn. Special mention also needs to go to the team managers Ewan Samway and Hamish Cook.

On behalf of all of the Sydney Convicts I would also like to express our continued gratitude to everybody at Colleagues who have made us feel so welcome and have provide the opportunity for Sydney Convicts to play rugby in such a fabulous club. The generosity you have shown us is well known around the world and is a model that many other gay clubs can only dream about being part of. In particular we would like to thank Rich McGrath, Dan Petrie, Cam Ireland, Andrew Moses, Peter Minocus, Mike Sommer, Andrew Harrington and all the guys in the Noice Cup team and the Colleagues Halligan team.

Noice Cup Report

2006 was the first year that Colleagues entered a side in the Noice Cup. This cup was named after a distinguished Colleague, C. S. Noice, who was killed in a tragic accident in 1981. Given the huge contribution made by the Noice family to the Colleagues Club, it was essential that we win the Noice Cup in the first year that we contested for it.

Colleagues' Noice Cup team won 11 of its 12 matches, scoring 296 points to 81 against. They were minor premiers.

Johnston, (fullbacks) N.Minato and C. Kernaghan. Most of these players played in several positions during the year and, given that we had extra players, all players happily accepted playing less than a full game in order to give the reserves a run. This was important for the harmony of the team. The team was ably captained by Chris Schliebs (although Shem Pearson always had a lot to say).

This was a team that enjoyed playing its rugby and drinking its beer. Dedication to training was outstanding -- on many an evening I had to make a run for the car park with the words "Come on Tra, can't we do just one more 400?" ringing in my ears.

In the last three matches of the season we played arch-rivals Roseville who were the only team to have beaten us in the year. (This occurred when our main team was playing in the Jeffery Cup in place of the Convicts who were participating in the Bingham Cup in New York.)

We won the last round of the season 10 -- 5 to win the minor premiership and the preliminary final 17 -- 0 but neither win was convincing. We analysed the reasons for our poor showing, developed some tactics to counter Roseville's tactics and practised them.

The grand final went exactly to plan. We scored a good try in the opening minutes through our backs and then were forced to defend grimly for a long period in our own 25 against their rolling maul, holding them up over the line. The tactics we had devised to counter Roseville worked well. By the end of the half, we had worked our way back into their 25 and they had begun conceding penalties, one of which we kicked. We went to half-time up 8 -- 0 after a tough 35 minutes.

The very successful Canterbury Crusaders coach, Robbie Deans, says that the aim of a rugby coach is to make himself redundant. That is, if the coach has done his job well, the players will know what to do without the coach telling them. At half-time in the grand final, the players knew exactly what they had to do in the second half -- in particular, if they scored first in the second half they would rack up a good tally. It was one of those moments when the coach remains silent.

The players proceeded to do exactly what they had to do, scoring a very good ensemble try soon after the kickoff and then adding three others all of which John Kelly converted from the sideline. All 22 players took the field. They did not let the pressure off Roseville and kept them scoreless, winning the match 36 -- 0.

I had asked the players to play their best rugby and they had delivered. This was the best rugby they played all year.

John Noice then presented us with the C. S. Noice Cup. Mission accomplished.

Thanks to the Convicts for supporting us at the grand final, running our water and buying us some cold beer. Special thanks to Mark Lanham for acting as timekeeper in the grand final and to Michael Kelly and James Stanford for acting as our runners when they were unable to play due to injury.

Thanks also to co-coaches Pete Minucos and Ben Woods and to Whiddon coach, Nick Love, who taught us more about short lineouts in five minutes than we've learnt in 10 years.

Meldrum Cup Report

So at the end of the round robin, Sydney University finished up minor premiers, with Colleagues finishing second. This meant a major semi final against Sydney University at UNSW. Despite an excellent performance, the team came up short 22-14. It was back to UNSW for the preliminary final against Bronte Surf Lifesaving Club a week later on an unusually hot day. The team simply did not show up and Bronte won the contest 63-21, who went on to win the grand final the following week.

It was a disappointing end to a season that promised a lot, however, the Meldrum Cup players can be proud of the positive brand of rugby they played and the number of friends they made on and off the paddock.

Halligan Cup Report

By our own previously high standards this was a disappointing year. Despite the number of registered players WCRUFC had in 2006, we regularly struggled to field a side. Whilst we did not forfeit or cancel any matches, we were reduced to less then 15 men on several occasions. The macro problem of club numbers was exacerbated by a much higher than usual injury toll. Many key players were unavailable due to injury for significant portions of the season, and this unavailability was crucial in our inability to be competitive, even with 15 or more players available.

The loss of Gus Ross in the first game of the year was a significant event of our season. As stated in email traffic after the event, the actions of those Colleagues players present, particularly Andrew Harrington and Bruce Gall brought great credit upon themselves and Colleagues as a club. A number of Halligan Cup players and Coaching Staff attended Gus's funeral.

The first quarter of the season we were quite competitive, and at one stage led the competition. As the season wore on the aforementioned injuries and players work and personal commitments meant that we were unable to field our best side week in week out and this resulted in a number of narrow losses.

A lack of fitness and in some cases match practice contributed to this as well. Many players did not train regularly and it was obvious that most of those who did were not doing additional fitness work during the week. This meant that against quality opposition (such as lggies) we were unable to match them physically. A shortage of forwards was an issue for Halligan as well. We only contested scrums in two matches during the year and even then for only part of the game.

It should be noted that from the outset I advised the players, on multiple occasions to ensure they had private health cover in the event they were injured.

Through all this, the biggest positive was the attitude of those who did play.

Almost without exception players put themselves on the line when out on the park and there was no loss which involved a capitulation. It was pleasing to see a nucleus of players from the 2005 squad return and these players formed the core of the side and helped foster esprit de corps. The same players did however express frustration at the constant 'chop and change' nature of the draw and the inability to get a full side on the park at times. Although it was pleasing that a number of players that started in Halligan played up the grades as the years progressed the players expressed dissatisfaction with the way that demotions from fifth grade were handled. Because of this a number of players later refused to play for 5ths when asked.

Towards the end of the season we became so short of players that we formed a joint side with the Convicts. As in 2005 this worked well, with both clubs benefiting from the arrangement. Credit should be given to both Rob Rosenberg and Andrew Purchas for their organisational skills and 'can-do' attitude.

Whilst I understand the reasons for the club fielding the number of grades it did in 2006 it should be noted that without a substantial infusion of players in 2007 it is my opinion that a similar level of commitment to lower divisions will result in the Halligan Cup side suffering viability problems in 2007.

Apart from the effect this has on the players, it means that for Andrew Harrington and me the workload trying to arrange games and organise players is excessive. Quite often both of us

would spend most of Thursday on the phone and email attempting to get things organised for the weekend.

This leads me to the other aspect that generated significant workload and that was the unworkability of the Halligan Cup draw. Many clubs committed to the competition then simply did not play, or refused to travel. I believe that Colleagues should submit to Subbies a proposal for a 'two-tier' draw. A guaranteed draw for those clubs who can field week in week out, and a 'casual' pool of other clubs who can organize games with other part-time Halligan teams or one of the tier one clubs who has a bye. The current system is unworkable unless you are unemployed and can devote substantial amounts of time to organising games each week.

Finally, Andrew Harrington and Sean Nicholson led and organized the side in an exemplarily fashion, particularly in my absence in the middle part of the season. Both men are an asset to Colleagues and Sean in particular will be missed next year as he is being moved to Perth with his employment.

We all enjoyed our season this year; team spirit was good with a number of social functions being held both at sponsors pubs as well as each others residences. 2007 will be a better year though if the issues raised above can be addressed.
