Let's bring back Bruce and his mates: Herb, George, Horace, Harold, Manu and Barbara.



Burke Cup Report

After three successful years of coaching together, Jono Hughes and I had a year of hurdles and a different type of player roster, which, amongst other things, lead to us having a shocking start to the year. After sneaking across the line in our first game against Forest we were thumped by 40+ points by Knox the next week. The signs were ominous.

The ensuing weeks saw another four losses on the trot, some close, some terrible. Then after some promising glimpses of progress including a great win away at Beecroft we'd coming crashing back to earth with an ordinary display. At the half way point of the season we had lost 6, won 3 and were in the unaccustomed position of fighting it out with the bottom feeders for the wooden spoon. Having only ever known the top end of the table in 7 seasons at Colleagues things were looking as bleak as the wintery training nights in season 2008. Many players would have (and some did) dropped their bundle and booked beach holidays for the first week of September, but not the core of the 2008 Burkies.

Whilst the results hadn't gone our way the changes in attitude and the emergence of a playing group and style of play we'd been working hard on to suit them started to look promising. Coming last with half a season to play turned every game into a must win challenge to make the finals. And win the boys started to do, cleaning up 6 of their next 9 games, many convincingly with bonus points, and only 3 tight losses.

Results in other games went our way and we had miraculously secured 4^{th} spot and a semi final spot a couple of games before the finals and were undeniably the form team of the competition. Some players stepped up and others dropped by the wayside en route – what we did have though by the first semi against Drummoyne was a solid group of experienced players and enthusiastic youngsters punching above their weight who didn't believe for a second that they couldn't win the competition.

An epic 21-15 victory against Drummoyne in the knock out semi-final saw us face defending premiers and arch rivals Knox Old Boys in the final. Knox had somehow lost to Iggies in major semi, setting up a massive game with us the following weekend. Unfortunately the Knox final was not to be, with our boys going down 13-8 in atrocious weather conditions that we didn't quite master. A last minute try to steal the game was disallowed by the man in the middle, some say mistakenly, and our season was over one game short of the big dance.

For me the team highlights of the season were the:

 Semi final victory against Drummoyne, which was the best example I've ever seen of a Colleagues muscling up and punching above its weight. Drummoyne





- fielded the biggest team anyone has ever seen in Subbies and our boys bashed them into submission, dominating scrums, lineouts and the breakdown.
- An inspirational comeback from 14-5 down at halftime against Mosman in early July to win 29-21 with a bonus point which effectively ended their season and kept ours on track.
- 3. The 32-25 loss at home against Knox on Old Colleagues day. Ironically despite the disappointment at the time this was the day that the team realised that they had the style of play and the ability to beat anyone on their day and that we would, not could, make the finals even if only having a mathematical chance at the time. The following 7 or so weeks of must win footy were the most enjoyable of my coaching life.
- 4. It wasn't just the more experienced players who lead the way. It was also the guys who may not have had much of a run in 2s or above in the past, or the young guys new to grade or the club, who really stepped up and proved their worth, becoming better rugby players and respected by fellow players as a result.

I didn't want to single anyone out but these blokes in particular deserve special mention:

- Luke McCann for leading the team around in general play and captaining the team so well during the run into the finals.
- 2. Alex Edwards for captaining the team so well, albeit reluctantly, before injury ruled him out for final the part of the year.
- 3. Will Jeffreys for his weekly hit-a-thon which made me doubly glad that I'd retired from playing rugby against blokes like him and that I bought a video camera to record the tackles!
- 4. Lachlan Benson for finally retiring and no longer giving me a reason to keep picking him despite my better judgement! You've been a great Colleague Lachy – enjoy retirement ... that is until Laurie calls you next year around semi finals time for Suthos!
- Hugheso for bringing the commitment and intensity on the training paddock and driving the new ball in hand style of play that served us so well. It's been great fun coaching with you mate and I wish you well for next season.

Boys thanks again for a really rewarding season. The loss in the knockout final against Knox was disappointing but the effort was first class. We were millimetres from qualifying for a grand final. To come from where you did during the season and grow

your game individually and as a squad made this year more rewarding for me than previous seasons where we belted the opposition and won premierships in a canter. I'm really proud of the belief you all showed. You will remember season 2008 for a long time.

I hope you all (except Benson!) play at Blue Giant Stadium again next year as Colleagues truly is the best rugby club in the world. I'll be down there to watch your home games with my new son Archie in tow next year, slowly introducing him to the intricacies of rush defence, counter rucking and "breaking the glass".
